
B'nei Mitzvah Service

Sacred Connections

Welcome to 2023! As Jews, we are fortunate to celebrate two new years—Rosh HaShanah and January 1st—two opportunities to reflect, rejoice and begin again. Of course, the way we observe these two holidays is guite different, with the focus of Rosh HaShanah on the spiritual and January 1st with more of a fun party atmosphere. In light of this, the "resolutions" I tend to make reflect the different nature of these days. As I write this column in November, I'm recovering from foot surgery. As many of you know, I fractured my foot this summer when leading what I now know is a dangerous sport, Israeli dancing, in Israel. Unfortunately, my foot never healed properly, which is why I'm now laid up with screws and a plate holding my left foot together. For the next 6-8 weeks, I will be on crutches or a scooter, completely dependent on others for something as simple as carrying a glass of water.

My despondency at my current situation leads me to my very personal January 1st resolution, and that is to bring more levity and laughter into my life. As it turns out, this is a very Jewish response. For centuries, Jews have responded to difficult situations with humor as a profoundly life-affirming coping mechanism. As Mel Brooks put it: "If they're laughing, how can they bludgeon you to death?" Laughter as a subversive response to authority dates all the way back to the Torah, when Sarah laughed after hearing that she would bear a child at the ripe old age of 90!

Laughter is the spigot that lets us blow off steam rather than explode. It provides solace when there is little to be had. From antisemitism to persecution to the threat of assimilation, Jews have good, if not ironic, reasons to laugh. And no one, not even God, is off limits when it comes to Jewish sarcasm and mockery.

For centuries, Jews have understood that lightening up through laughter is not only good for the soul, it's good for our hearts and minds, too. When we are stressed out, as it is so easy to be in our hyper-polarized and angry world, our muscles are tense, our breathing is shallow, and our blood pressure may even rise. "Levity is our primary vehicle for restoring a relaxed state," * says Emiliana Simon-Thomas, science director of the Greater Good Science Center at the University of California, Berkeley. It provides a buffer from the mental and physical stress that underpins so much of life today. It can deescalate a potentially explosive situation in an

instant and transform a fraught setting to one that is playful and light. In short, laughter costs nothing and helps us feel better instantly.

Best of all, laughing is social and contagious. A few weeks ago I was visiting my three-month-old grandson Yoshi in Sacramento. I sat on the couch with my daughter and her wife, and he was perched on my knees facing me. Suddenly, we were interrupted by a small explosion erupting from Yoshi's backside. We burst out laughing in surprise. Yoshi, seeing our surprised and delighted faces, giggled in response. This was the first time I ever heard him laugh. His laughter deepened our joy, and for a moment or two, we all chortled together. It is a moment I cherish and savor, and even reflecting on it makes me smile.

As we navigate our way through the complicated alchemy of 2023, with a fraught political climate at home and in Israel, the lingering pandemic and whatever other personal challenges we may experience, may we each find a way to bring joy, laughter, light and hope into this new year of 2023. Join us for our special *Kavanah* Retreat this month,

led by Rabbi Josh Feigelson, President of the Insitute of Jewish Spirituality, to learn more strategies for cultivating resilience and joy. Come pray and sing with us on Shabbat. Share a meal with a friend and find ways to make each other laugh. Let us look for reasons to be delighted, rather than disappointed in the world of 2023. Hopefully our laughter will bring us the strength we need to transcend any hardship in our way.

The environmental setting is constructed to be an interactive palate which takes shape in relation to the studies and learning experiences and you will see evidence of how materials are essential to the learning process. When our children graduate, we know our world will be blessed by their future contributions because their voices are empowered to create a system of change and growth.

Five hundred, twenty five thousand, six hundred minutes Five hundred, twenty five thousand moments so dear Five hundred, twenty five thousand, six hundred minutes How do you measure, measure a year?

In daylights, in sunsets In midnights, in cups of coffee In inches, in miles In laughter, in strife

In five hundred, twenty five thousand, six hundred minutes
How do you measure a year in a life?

As one secular year ends and another begins, I always find myself reflecting on these lyrics from the song "Seasons of Love" from the musical *Rent*, written by the late Jonathan Larson. Anyone who really knows me knows that I love musical theater. I was in that group of teens in high school who would spontaneously burst into show tunes in the hallways because somebody unknowingly said a single word that provided our cue. On long solo drives, I will choose to listen to a Broadway soundtrack over an audio book every time. Beyond the pure joy I get from immersing myself in these musical worlds, I find there is so much truth to learn about life from these stories – not dissimilar to the lessons we learn from the stories of the Torah.

I have had many opportunities to connect the two worlds of Judaism and musical theater; this extends far beyond productions of *Fiddler on the Roof*. While serving on the faculty of the URJ 6 Points Creative Arts Academy each summer, I often work with the musical theater major and connect whatever the campers are working on with Jewish themes, values, and traditions. I have led text studies framed entirely by songs from *Hamilton*. For a *tefilah* experience at URJ Camp Coleman, I created "Broadway Bracha," and still maintain that playlist in my Spotify for times when I need a boost of spiritual enhancement from the world of theater.

While there are many ideas that overlap between these two worlds, there is one that consistently jumps out at me as a core component of each—that of community. In Judaism, there is very little that we are supposed to do on an individual basis; almost every tradition has a communal aspect to it. We are supposed to have at least 10 people for a prayer service, as this is the minimum number to be considered a community. As we read the opening chapters of Exodus this month, we quickly realize that this is not the story of

Moses, but rather the journey of the Jewish people as they move together toward the Promised Land. In fact, along the way, when some of the Israelites become selfish, they are severely punished by G-d, further reinforcing the importance of putting the needs of the community first. In *Pirkei Avot* 2:4, Hillel is quoted as saying, "Al tifrosh min hatzibur—Do not separate yourself from the community."

As for musical theater? Here is just a sampling of songs that resonate with the concept of community and surrounding oneself with others:

"You Are Not Alone" from Into the Woods

"You'll Never Walk Alone" from Carousel

"You Will be Found" from Dear Evan Hansen

"We Go Together" from Grease

"For Good" from Wicked

I would be remiss not to mention the entirety of *Come From Away*, an incredible show based on the true story of a small town in eastern Canada that welcomed in 38 planes full of strangers from around the world on September 11, 2001 – the very epitome of creating community and caring for others.

The lyrics above ask, "How do you measure a year?" This is answered in the next line: "How about love?" One of the seminal passages in the Torah reads, "V'ahavta l'reiacha kamocha—Love your neighbor as yourself." Seems that if we take our cues from both Jewish tradition and musical theater, and plan to spend our year both giving and accepting love, we might spend these five hundred, twenty five thousand, six hundred minutes of 2023 surrounded in the meaning, beauty, and peace that can be found in community with one another.

Climate Change!

As we enter a new secular year, I want to tell you more about our Social Justice Network project for 2023 - Climate Change. You may have noticed the topic on the cover of our SJN brochure which you received during the High Holy Days. As the specifics of this work continue to evolve, there are some exciting developments that we can now share.

We will be partnering with the National Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition and Hazon (A Jewish Lab for Sustainability) to make Temple Beth Sholom a more sustainable, environmentally friendly, and "green" institution. As a community, we will create a climate action plan with concrete steps that we can take over a period of years. This will be a process. Some of the areas that we will be working on include investing in clean power for our facilities, reducing or offsetting our emissions, better managing our resources, and conserving waste through projects like composting. There will be aspects of this work for everyone in our community, from the youngest children and teens to adults. Some of these things can be reproduced in the home.

We look forward to having Justice Jams led by Rachel Unger and Andrea Wagner. We hope to have Rabbi Luisa Sinacore lead the Justice Jams too. These will be educational opportunities that will discuss climate change, action steps, and allow for making connections to Jewish values. We will also be working with these local organizations on climate change projects:

- The CLEO Institute, a non-profit, non-partisan organization exclusively dedicated to climate crisis education and advocacy.
 They work with communities across Florida to build climate literacy and mobilize climate action for a just and resilient future.
- Miami Water Keepers, an organization that works to ensure swimmable, drinkable, fishable waters for all in Florida.
- Higher Ground Initiative, to bring awareness to sea level rise on Miami Beach and the barrier islands.
- Love the Everglades, which engages with our schools on Everglades education and awareness.
- Green Haven, an inner-city farm and food pantry in a Miami food desert.

- Surfrider Miami, which works to keep the beaches clean and to test water quality throughout Miami Beach and Key Biscayne.
- Food Rescue US for donation of excess food from TBS events.

We look forward to everyone being involved.



LIVING MINDFUL JEWISH LIVES AND HELPING OTHERS DO THE SAME



The Kavanah Council is pleased to welcome Rabbi Josh Feigelson, PhD, our visiting scholar for the 5th Annual Kavanah Retreat on January 20 and 21. Josh was appointed Executive Director of the Institute for Jewish Spirituality ("IJS") in January 2020 and became President & CEO in April 2022. Josh is a noted scholar who revolutionized IJS during Covid, transforming it from a small, cohort-based teaching institute into a dynamic, expansive, inclusive leader in the field of Jewish spirituality.

IJS offers programs and resources to "Cultivate Mindfulness, Deepen Connection, and Enliven Jewish Life." Its vision is of a world in which spiritual practice is a vital part of Jewish life, leading to compassion, justice, and peace. Its mission is to develop and teach Jewish spiritual practices so that individuals and communities may experience greater awareness, purpose, and interconnection. Since the onset of the pandemic and under Josh's leadership, IJS developed a range of free online resources that have engaged spiritual seekers over 300,000 times. It partnered with organizations ranging from the JCC Association to PJ Library, to bring its programming to new, expanded, diverse audiences and modernized its delivery methods. IJS pioneered research into the spiritual lives of young American Jews to help them address the critical challenges and opportunities they face. IJS also broadened and deepened its tuition based courses to further its influence and reach.





Message from our Sister Congregation in Israel

Mutual Responsibility

It has been about half-a-year since I visited with you in Miami and the memories are still vivid in my mind. The congregation hosted me very graciously and Rabbi Pomerantz and Mark Baranek invested personal efforts to make me feel as a special guest. During the course of my visit I learned just how significant the TBS commitment is to Israel in general and to the furthering of liberal Judaism in the Jewish homeland in particular. I hope that our relationship will continue to develop in the future and that TBS congregants will view Kehilat (Congregation) "HaDror" as an inseparable part of their home-base in Israel.

As the two major centers of Jewish life, American and Israeli Jews have many issues to ponder—certainly after our recent Israeli elections, which have brought to power a coalition inimical to liberal values, both religiously and politically. This leaves us with an assortment of questions:

Has there been a change in the feelings of American Jewry toward the state and the people of Israel? Do we still share solidarity?

If so, do we have the right—or the responsibility—to make our voices heard in matters of policy, even if this entails criticism? Should differences of opinion---even critical ones—have an effect upon basic support?

The incoming government will be forced to deal with many significant challenges. In addition to internal and external security concerns which pretty much unite the Israeli public, they are committed to a variety of positions which divide us. Some concern the democratic process. Others concern the status of liberal Judaism and that of Israeli Arabs and the veteran community of African Asylum Seekers.

The members of the coalition exult in the fact that this will be an "all Right" government (Conservative nationalists, "messianic" Religious Nationalists, Ultra-Orthodox parties). Others, including the bulk of liberal Jews and their rabbis, anticipate difficult days.

This is certainly an appropriate occasion for dialogue between our two communities.

In the face of many challenges please remember that we need your support and see our struggle for *Tikkun Olam* (Mending the world) as one!"
