Sacred Connections

Rabbi Gayle Pomerantz

The Jewish People are known as "the People of the Book" because of our great life-long love of learning and stories. In fact, Elie Wiesel said that God created humans because God loves stories. People of the Book also happens to be the name of a great work of historic fiction by Geraldine Brooks, which focuses on the still extant Sarajevo Haggadah, one of the oldest living Jewish illuminated texts. Brooks' book recently appeared on the My Jewish Learning's website list of 120 Jewish books, one for every year of life.

As a prodigious reader, I took great pleasure in reviewing the list, seeing how many I've read (about half, still plenty of reading to do!) and then reflecting on what would be on my list to share. I was also thrilled to order the books for ages 1 (My First Jewish Baby Book) and 2 (Goodnight Bubbala) for my first grandchild born August 21! The list brought back many memories: Anne Frank, which I read as a child in religious school, Exodus and The Source, which were required reading when I went to High School in Israel, Herschel and the Hanukkah Goblins, with a scary goblin my children used to love, *The Red Tent*, which opened new doors of women's spirituality for me and The Jewish Catalog, which I devoured as a young adult. More recently, Sarah Hurwitz's Here All Along, which I love sharing with those new to Judaism, The Sabbath, by Abraham Joshua Heschel (my copy is worn from so many readings) and Martin Buber's I and Thou, which is designated for year 120, but I urge you not to wait that long to read it.

As the daughter of an elementary school librarian, I have always loved books. When I was in grade school, I used to help my mother do inventory in the library at the end of the year and open new boxes of books to add to the shelves at the beginning of a school year. I love the weight of a book in my hand, the smell of fresh pages and most of all, the promise of being transported in time and space to another land, another life and another story. Through books we learn about people, history, culture and the language of emotions. Through reading we learn facts and values, and just as importantly, we learn empathy for the other, whose story we now know. With a book (or Kindle, or iPad...) in your hand you are never alone.

While I'm always engaged in expanding my mind through non-fiction, I must confess that my true pleasure is fiction. This summer I discovered a new bonus that comes with reading novels. According to Dr. Richard Restak, a neurologist who provided "Tips to Protect Your Memory" in the New York Times, reading novels boosts memory retention.

Fiction requires you to engage with the text, and work through a story. "You have to remember what the character did on page three by the time you get to page 11," he said.

After savoring a good book, one of the great joys in life is sharing it with someone you care about. In Ann Patchett's book of essays I'm now reading, *These Precious Days*, she says, "As every reader knows, the social contract between you and a book you love is not complete until you can hand that book to someone else and say, 'Here, you're going to love this."

I was recently studying with one of our upcoming B'Mitzvah learners, and we were exploring the idea of Sukkot within the context of freedom.

Yes, that is right - freedom. No, I do not have the wrong holiday.

Obviously, Pesach is the festival which is most closely aligned with our celebration of freedom. After all, this is when we gather around a table and retell the story of the Exodus, as the Israelites were led out of slavery and began the trek to the Promised Land.

Sukkot and Pesach are significant benchmarks in our Jewish calendar. They are both one-week long and occur exactly six months apart. Pesach, the festival that commemorates our birth as a people, is celebrated in the spring, while the harvest festival of Sukkot is observed in the fall. Our calendar is constructed precisely so these festivals will happen at these specific times. In this way, Pesach and Sukkot function as bookends to each half-year cycle of our lives. We even change part of our Amidah liturgy at each of these points – one at the start of Pesach and the other at the end of Sukkot.

Bookends can be identical, but they can also be paired as similar but not exact matches – as if they are fraternal twins (something we are well-versed about in my house!). So, while Sukkot might not be specifically about freedom, there are elements of freedom abounding in the festival – if only we know how to see them.

Perhaps the obvious connection is the freedom to be outside in nature, since we spend a significant amount of time during Sukkot connecting with the natural world. I am not sure I love this as a strong connection, though, because we are free to be outside whenever we want – especially here in south Florida!

Many modern rabbis relate this idea of freedom to the holiday that immediately precedes Sukkot - Yom Kippur. It is said that Yom Kippur is the happiest day of the Jewish year, which seems absurd on the surface since we spend an entire day fasting. The idea is that we spend this time focused inward and absolving ourselves of the things we have done wrong over the past year, making a commitment to do better moving forward. By the time Yom Kippur ends, we should feel pure and happy! We then immediately look toward Sukkot; both literally and metaphorically, we move from the inside to the outside - from containment to freedom.

We learn in the Talmud all sorts of rules about building a

sukkah, and what constitutes a "kosher" one. Again, this does not seem to immediately conjure up images of freedom. There are so many laws to keep straight! But we should remember that we actually gain freedom by having some boundaries. Being free does not mean that we all get to do whatever we want. Instead, we need guidelines in which to live, which allows us to be free with a comfortable understanding of our expectations as individuals and as community members. There might be rules about building a legal sukkah – but there is also wiggle room, giving us some freedom to create within the lines. And of course, there are so many different ways in which we are free to decorate our sukkot!

Perhaps the most salient connection of Sukkot and freedom derives from the likely origination of another holiday. I noted earlier that Pesach and Sukkot are bookends - week-long festivals that occur six months apart from one another. There is one other festival that lasts for this amount of time - the Festival of Lights. Yes, Chanukah, while not a biblical holiday, is very closely aligned with Sukkot. It is believed that when the Maccabees were fighting in the war, they were not able to stop and observe Sukkot. Once the war ended, realizing they had missed a pretty significant commandment, the Maccabees decided they should essentially make up for it by celebrating Sukkot a couple of months late. Thus, Chanukah was born - a holiday that commemorates the ability for the Jewish people to practice our religion freely. So, when we construct our sukkot in places that are visible to others, we are not only observing the mitzvot of the festival. Much like putting a chanukiyah in the window for all to see, a sukkah is also a way to proclaim that we are Jewish and free to celebrate that. While this is sadly not the case for all Jewish people, for those of us who enjoy freedom of religion, Sukkot is a perfect time to reflect on that and to pray that it becomes reality for our Jewish siblings throughout the world.


*Israel Fellows:


Conversing in a Polarized World
