### **Sacred Connections**

Rabbi Gayle Pomerantz

Rabbi Pomerantz's Sermon from Friday, October 13, 2023

When I was a junior in college studying at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem for a year, my roommate was dear friends with the Halevi family, Tzvika and Tami, and their three beautiful kids. We loved visiting them on their kibbutz, Nachal Oz, sharing Shabbat dinner, learning kibbutznik ways and history, and picking almonds from their fragrant trees.

Tzvika and Tami were salt of the earth Halutzim, true Israeli pioneers. Tami's family left Nazi Germany in 1934 and Tzvika's left Russia soon after the Bolshevik Revolution. His father was born in Palestine and came to live at Kibbutz Nachal Oz when he was only 15 years old.

This kibbutz, which I remember so lovingly, is less than half a mile from the border with Gaza, so close that the Iron Dome cannot operate there. A week ago, there were 400 members of this kibbutz. Today, more than half of them are dead or hostages.

Some of you may have heard Amir Tibon's horrifying account on the news this week. Amir is a reporter for the Israeli newspaper, Ha'aretz, and a resident of the kibbutz, where he lived with his wife and two daughters. They moved there from Tel Aviv as a young couple, deciding they wanted a quieter life. On the morning of Shabbat and Simchat Torah, their kibbutz was ruthlessly invaded and held siege by Hamas, or as one resident said, "It was a murderous pogrom" on Jewish soil. Amir fled to the safe room with his family and was holed up there with no food for 10 hours trying to keep their 3-yearold and 1-year-old daughters quiet. As the minutes passed, with the sound of terror drawing near, they prepared to die. Their only hope for rescue was Amir's father, a former general. Before he lost cell phone connection, Amir had contacted his parents in desperation,

and without hesitation, his parents ran to their car and head across the country to rescue them.

When they came to Sderot, they saw people running barefoot escaping from the music festival. They opened their car and drove some to safety. Along the way, his 62-year-old father, armed with only a pistol, stopped at an ambush of Israeli soldiers and took the wounded to safety.

As the hours ticked by, Amir kept whispering to his children, "Saba b'derech - Grandpa's on his way." At 4:00 pm, there was a bang on their window and a voice they recognized: "Saba higia!" Amir's daughter cried, "Grandpa is here!"

Amir's father and another former general he picked up along the way, went door to door on the kibbutz rooting out terrorists and saving lives.

October 7th was the worst day in

Israel's history, with more people killed in one day than at any time since the Shoah. We are reeling from this week's depravity. The losses are staggering. We are feeling anguish and anxious. We are feeling outraged and vengeful, shocked and powerless. Our hearts are shattered. For the first time in my life, I have heard Israelis in utter despair, feeling abandoned by their leaders. But this week was also a time of profound heroism and solidarity. Our congregant, Marc Rivo was there, and reported to his wife Karen that as he was heading north in his car on Sunday, he saw cars abandoned all along the highway. Over 360,000 men and women were called up to serve and almost 100% showed up, including those who had been protesting the right wing government, leaving their cars on the highway to catch a bus, leaving children, spouses, home, and jobs putting their lives on the line to protect Israel, our Jewish homeland.

These soldiers are our friends, cousins, parents and children; we are one family, one people, Am Echad.

I heard about one soldier on the news, face timing with his family on the roadside at his son's bris. And about a woman who was nine months pregnant rushing to the hospital in an ambulance, not to give birth, but because her husband had been shot and was in a coma. The devastation is unthinkable. The terrorists' actions are barbaric. obscene, brutal; there are no words strong enough for their savagery. The Israeli Army has an expression: "War is the kingdom of uncertainty." We don't know what will come next. Right now, Israel has the world's support, mostly. But if history has taught us anything, "People love dead Jews" as the writer Dara Horn proclaims in her book of that name. As victims, we have the world's sympathy, but with a gun in our hand, the world is much less forgiving. Innocent people have suffered and will suffer, including Israelis and innocent Palestinians who have lived under the thumb of brutal Hamas. It cannot be avoided, although I hope and pray the casualties of innocents will be minimal on both sides.

None of us knows the right way for Israel to respond in this horrific situation in which they must attempt to save hostages and demolish the perpetrators of "pure unadulterated evil," as President Biden put it. Thank you to President Biden for his clear, forceful, and unequivocal support of Israel. This week, 80 years ago, a group of 400 rabbis came to Washington to meet with President Roosevelt about Jewish persecution in Europe and they were refused entry into the White House. Yesterday, President Biden met with Jewish leaders and demonstrated his explicit support while Secretary of State Blinken was in Israel.

### **KEHILLA** and *Am Yisrael Chai*

All educators at The Innovative School at Temple Beth Sholom enter a relationship with this Jewish community and bring Israel into their periphery. This year, as we revisit our trademarked KEHILLA APPROACH, I

search for inspiration in the slogan "Am Yisrael Chai" alongside three main ideas centered around Kehilla building. These are isolation, the delicate balance that exists between



the individual and community, and how diverse communities interact with each other.

When I think about Am Yisrael Chai (The people

of Israel Live) the word adoption immediately comes to mind, alongside the understanding that Israel is a driving force that embraces all those who want to participate. It is a place where the "mixed multitude" that sojourned with Jacob's children out of Egypt continues to be welcomed. In Israel, I am home, and I find myself thinking, yes, for sure I AM YISRAEL CHAI because through Reform Judaism, Israel adopted me.

The adoption begins with the same process God went through to turn the family of Jacob into a nation that would see itself as separate, yet welcome the stranger. It seems that the isolation in the desert for 40 years was necessary to forge a people who shared a common ideology on how life should be lived. Therefore, community building requires a certain

separateness. Our expression of that separateness is gently steered by the interactions that begin and are nourished within this building. Beyond the initial community-forming process, the members still need

elbow room to be themselves and to honor their individuality. Anything short of this would become oppression and the self will wither. As can be expected, people explore personal interests,

talents, circumstances etc. Diverse sub-communities interacting with each other begin to occur naturally and are inevitable.



I would venture to say that our expression of KEHILLA at The Innovative School has all of these components. We are Jewish at our core and that separates us from the rest. yet we respect individuality and other communities. When I look around the beautiful kaleidoscope of diverse peoples that frequent our school, it informs me that the mixed multitude is here. and that we welcome the stranger. The People of

Yisrael Live (Am Yisrael Chai) and within them a beautiful expression of KEHILLA (Kindness, Empathy, Honesty, Integrity, Lifelong Leaning and Acceptance) can all be found at The Innovative School.

### Barb Shimansky, RJE Director of School for Living Judaism

At this time of year, we are reminded of the importance of thankfulness and gratitude. When we take the time to appreciate the good things in our lives, big and small, it can have a profound impact on our well-being.

In Judaism, we are taught to be grateful for the many blessings we have received. Traditionally, we start each morning reciting these words: "Modeh ani lefaneḥa meleḥ ḥai vekayam, she'he'ḥezarta bee nishmatee b'ḥemla, raba emunatecha - I offer thanks to You, our G-d, for You have mercifully restored my soul within me; Your faithfulness is great." This is a declaration of our gratitude to G-d for giving us the gift of life each day.

We also have prayers such as Birkat Hagomel, which we say after recovering from a serious illness or surviving a dangerous journey, and Shehecheyanu, which is the prayer thanking G-d for bringing us to a specific moment. In fact, Talmud Menachot 43b reads: "Rabbi Meir said: A person is obligated to recite 100 blessings every day as it is said, 'What does G-d ask of you?' (Deut. 10:12). Instead of "ma" (what?), read it as "mea" (the number 100)." Therefore, we thank G-d throughout the day with blessings for our family, our friends, our health, our homes, and our food.

Gratitude is not only a Jewish virtue, but it is also a psychological one. Studies have shown that people who are grateful are happier and healthier than those who are not. Gratitude can help to reduce stress, improve sleep, and boost the immune system.

It is important to teach our children the importance of thankfulness and gratitude. We can do this by modeling grateful behavior ourselves, and by helping them to identify the good things in their own lives.

Here are a few tips for teaching your children about thankfulness and gratitude:

- Model grateful behavior. When you express gratitude for the good things in your own life, your children are more likely to do the same. For example, you can say things like, "I'm so grateful for our family" or "I'm so grateful for this delicious meal." (You could even say HaMotzi as a Jewish way to show gratitude for our food!)
- Help your children identify the good things in their lives. Ask them questions like, "What are you grateful for today?" or "What are your favorite things about your life?"
- Encourage your children to express their gratitude. They can do this by saying "thank you" to the people who help them, by writing thank-you notes, or by doing something nice for someone else.

Thankfulness and gratitude are important qualities for everyone to possess. By teaching our children about thankfulness and gratitude, we can help them to live happier and healthier lives.

Here are some activities that you can do with your children to reinforce ideas about thankfulness and gratitude as we approach Thanksgiving:

- Make a gratitude jar. Every day, have your children write down one thing they are grateful for on a piece of paper and put it in the jar. On Shabbat, read through the jar together and talk about all the good things in your lives.
- Keep a gratitude journal. Have your children write down or draw one thing they are grateful for each day in a journal. This can be a great way to reflect on the good things in your lives

and to see how much you have to be grateful for.

- Do a random act of kindness. Encourage your children to do something kind for someone else, such as holding the door open for someone, helping a neighbor carry their groceries, or donating to a charity of their choice.
- Volunteer your time together.
   Volunteer your time to a cause that you are passionate about. This is a great way to teach your children about the importance of giving back and helping others. We have many opportunities throughout the year at Temple Beth Sholom!

By doing these activities with your children, you can help them to develop a lifelong habit of thankfulness and gratitude.

With thanks and gratitude for sharing your children with us, and allowing me to be part of the village who is raising them.





### **Social Justice**

The Social Justice Network has been busy at the start of this Jewish new year. We had our first meeting of the year in September, with over 25 people in attendance.

Our Reproductive Rights team, led by Myra Spindel and Barbara Gelber, has been collecting petitions at school functions and over the holidays. So far, the statewide coalition (of which Temple Beth Sholom and RAC-FL are a part) have collected close to 700,000 petitions out of the one million that are needed. Over Rosh Hashanah we collected over 100 petitions at TBS. So far, Temple Beth Sholom has collected and submitted 800 petitions. RAC-FL's goal is 80,000 petitions by the end of December.

Our Gun Violence Prevention Task Force, through the leadership of Hilary Feldman and Lauren Cantor, has organized all five Miami-Dade Reform Temples. They met in early September and are working on education and advocacy throughout the year. Over Sukkot, a time when we recognize the fragility of life, we partnered with the 4th and 5th grade of the Innovative School (and their teacher and SJN co-chair, Rachel Unger) to collect diapers and other baby needs for the most vulnerable in our community. These items were donated to the Miami Diaper Bank, founded by a TBS family. Did you know that the government does not recognize diapers as a basic need, and they are not eligible for federally subsidized food stamps? One in three American families has to choose between diapers and other basic needs like food? No parent should ever have to choose between providing these basic necessities for their family. Thank you to everyone who donated diapers, wipes and formula.

From Sunday, March 24, through Tuesday, March 26, 2024 (during Spring Break), we will lead a family civil rights journey to the South with Etgar36. The goal of the journey is to empower participants to get involved politically and socially in order to create change in the world. We will meet with organizations, educators, politicians, activists, artists,





"Belonging to Creation" with Dr. Patty Feito - Special Zoom Meditation Session on Tuesday, December 5 at 6:30 pm

Dr. Patty Feito, English professor and *Kavanah* Council member, will be guiding us in practices that invite us to enter into relationship with the natural world. I'd also like to reinforce those sensory experiences with some brief and easy writing prompts and just sit back and watch what emerges. It should be fun!"



Though this murderous attack has unleashed generations of trauma on the Jewish people, we are no longer defenseless and we are no longer stateless.

But this is an existential moment for Israel and an existential moment for the Jewish people. This is a moment when we must reaffirm our solidarity with Israel. We know that when Israel is vulnerable, we are vulnerable. We know that Israel's strength Is the Jewish people's strength.

The past year has been challenging for many Zionists like me, who were disillusioned with an ultra-right-wing Israeli government fracturing Israeli society and driving a wedge between American Jews. But this is a moment for us to come together, Israelis on the left and Israelis on the right, American Jews on the left and American Jews on the right,

Israeli Jews and American Jews are unified in our commitment to Israel's security and the future of our Jewish homeland. Our support is so critical at this moment. Israelis have told me that hearing from people around the world has heartened them, seeing the Brandenberg Gate in Germany lit up in blue and white and the Eiffel Tower and the White House. Getting phone calls and texts from caring people demonstrates that Israel is not alone. We must take our cues from Israel. whose story is improbable and miraculous. Jews have survived through millennia because of our resolve and resilience.

I know many of us are pumped up with anger and vengeance right now. We want to pummel Hamas with our bare hands, To obliterate them. We want to scratch that itch of revenge. But I'd like to suggest that we take all that anger and fear and anxiety we feel and channel it into something positive, something helpful. This week's Torah portion, Bereshit, challenges us with Cain's words after murdering his brother Abel: "Shomer ahi anochi? Am I my

brother's keeper?" The answer is most definitely yes. Let us be inspired by the thousands of Israelis who have showed up to dig graves, to prepare meals, to provide homes for the displaced, to rescue one another. Let us be inspired by people like the anonymous man who showed up at the El Al counter in New York and paid for the plane tickets for 250 reservists who were called up for duty. Let us be inspired by the non-Jews who have shown up to demonstrate their horror and solidarity, the countless officials and foreign dignitaries who showed up at the rally at the memorial this week. Let us be inspired by the donations that are pouring in, all the acts of love that are being generated out of the pain.

This past summer when I was in Israel I bought a necklace. It has one word etched in the silver, ahava, love. It's only natural to want to focus on hate right now, but hate will never repair what is broken, hate will never heal angry wounds.

A very wise teacher, Mr. Rogers, once said: "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me,

"Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping."
Let us be among the helpers, supporting each other, standing with our family in Israel and remaining loud and proud to be Jewish and Zionist. In this moment of heartbreak and terror, we will not let hate destroy us. Let us find a way, instead, to be guided by love – love for Israel, love for the Jewish people and love for each other.


