Sacred Connections

Back in December of 1990, when Adam and I became parents in San Francisco, the normal procedure was to discharge the mother and baby from the hospital within 24 hours of giving birth. I distinctly remember Adam and I leaving the UCSF hospital with several glances over our shoulders, waiting for someone to stop us. How could they possibly allow us to take this brand-new human being home with us when we had absolutely no idea what we were doing?! But no one stopped us. We got to the parking lot where our trusty white Honda Civic awaited us with our new infant car seat and made our getaway home. The rest is history.

As any new parent knows, babies don't come with an "owner's manual" or any kind of instruction book, other than the plethora of "parenting" books on the market, many of which contradict each other. Jewish parenting can be equally as confusing. Jews are practiced in the art of questioning, and nobody asks better questions than children.

I recently read this great excerpt from Kevin Moffett's <u>The Best Short Stories of 2022:</u>

"At IKEA my son asks why there are so many pregnant women shopping. I tell him I'm not sure. He asks if women go to IKEA to get pregnant and, although I am intrigued by the idea of women going to IKEA to get pregnant, I restrain myself from telling him that yes, they do. I say maybe they do."

The truth is, most of us don't know the answers to many of the great questions children ask, particularly about God. Sometimes, we avoid answering them because we aren't sure and don't want to look foolish. This is where the synagogue may really lend support, even though there are questions we cannot answer either!

In Hebrew, the word for parent, "hora", has the same Hebrew root as the word for teacher, "morah," and Torah. Essentially this teaches us that parents, teachers and Torah are the 3-pronged foundation for Jewish learning. Even when a child receives an excellent Jewish education at school, if there is no

Jewish learning or practice at home, the student's understanding will wobble. Parents and teachers must work hand in hand to teach Torah in a way that can be fully integrated into a person's life.

This month we celebrate *Simchat Torah*, the holiday when we Rejoice in Torah and consecrate all our new religious school students in Kindergarten and First Grade. They have the honor of the first *hakafa*, marching around the Sanctuary with the mini Torahs they receive. It is a privilege to launch them on this life-long journey of Jewish learning.

I recently started listening to a brand-new podcast produced by the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem called "Perfect Jewish Parents" (there's no such thing). It is a thought-provoking and educational podcast to support Jewish parents. PJ Library, which delivers monthly age-specific books to Jewish children, is another resource to stimulate Jewish conversations and learning at home. The Union for Reform Judaism also has Jewish summer camps, podcasts, holiday games and recipes to educate Jewish children.

At Temple Beth Sholom we are blessed to be your partners in Jewish education at Shalom Baby, JLab, our Innovative School, Tot Shabbat, holiday events and b-mitzvah celebrations. Please reach out to us for support when you need it. As any parent or grandparent knows, there is no perfect formula for educating our Jewish children. But the best place for that education to begin is at home.

Innovative School

The Innovative School Faculty Named to EdTech Innovation Cohort

At the beginning of the academic year, our Innovative School Elementary level Director of Judaic Studies, Barbara Schpilberg, and Studio/ Lab Specialist, Miriam Cruz, were selected to join the 2023 Center for the Advancement of Jewish Education (CAJE) TeacherPreneurship Initiative: a program for educators who are agents of change, embrace entrepreneurship and innovation in their professional lives and encourage it among their students. During the year-long training program, Ms. Barbara and Ms. Miriam participated in nine workshops that prepared them to design an EdTech learning product for our school. These workshops were conducted by MindCET, an Israeli innovation

accelerator that connects startups, educators, researchers, learners, industry leaders, investors, and policymakers to offer alternative solutions relevant to the learner of the digital age. This culminated in a six-day conference at MindCET's headquarters located in our sister city of Yerucham, Israel.

"By the time we traveled to the desert town of Yerucham, we knew that we wanted to create a valuable tool that could enable general studies teachers that work in Jewish schools to seamlessly integrate Jewish content, values, and traditions into their lessons. I believe that by creating meaningful connections between subjects, learners can develop a stronger sense of their Jewish identity while also deepening their understanding of general studies topics," explained Barbara. They named their product idea "EdJEWcator: Connecting General Studies with Judaism" and created a logo and landing page. The platform EdJEWcator promises to be an interactive community-based library of integrated content organized by subject matter where educators around the world can collaborate and share their lessons and experiences.

Why the need for EdJEWcator?

In the diaspora, many Jewish schools face the challenge of balancing two distinct curriculums: the national curriculum, which is aligned with the country's educational standards, and the Judaic studies curriculum. These two curriculums often operate independently, without meaningful integration or dialogue, which can create a disconnect for students and hinder the development of their Jewish identity. As Jewish educators, we want learners to develop a stronger connection to their Judaism, strengthen their Jewish identity, and recognize the relevance of Jewish teachings in all aspects of their education.

How does it work?



"I had the incredible opportunity of traveling to Israel with fellow educator Barbara Schpilberg as part of an experimental journey, set up through CAJE (pronounced Sage) to collaborate with teachers from Jewish Day Schools throughout the country and the world. We

landed in Tel Aviv a few days before and within hours we were in old Jerusalem. Walking through the gates and down the cobbled paths wasa Möbius strip of sensations and experiences. We kept going back to these experiences. Next, we headed to the desert town of Yerucham to participate in the conference. Finally ending our trip in Tel Aviv, the lively and open beach culture, with the heart and urgency of a democratic movement also flowing through its bustling streets. There is so much camaraderie here, said Barbara at one point when we were walking one night through Jerusalem. Yes! I thought this perfectly captures what we felt. This is the spirit and essence of this wonderful country and journey."

An experience like this is priceless for teachers in our school. The atmosphere at MindCET is warm and exhilarating and broadens one's perspective about what it means to be an educator and collaborator in creating ed-tech solutions for our school and the wider community. Yerucham, our sister city, has a strong and inspiring social advocacy community, a burgeoning artist movement and collective, excellent and thought-provoking educators, original grassroots gastronomy, and many avenues for cultural exchange. Experiencing this is meaningful and enriching for the mind and soul!

Although we are just getting settled into fall, it is already time to start thinking about how to engage our kids for summer 2024!

Many of you know that I spend time each summer at the URJ 6 Points Creative Arts Academy, where I get to help create the magical fun of an educational and enriching summer experience for Jewish youth from across North America.

TBS partners with several URJ camps to collectively offer year-round Jewish experiences for our children. There are so many benefits for children who attend Jewish camp:

- Socialization. Campers can make new Jewish friends from all over the world. They learn to interact with people from different backgrounds and cultures, which helps them develop important social skills while participating in activities, learning together, and building lasting connections and friendships. (Camp friends are the best friends!) Campers learn to rely on and support each other as they live and work together; this valuable peer experience emphasizes the importance of teamwork and cooperation.
- Jewish identity. Camp is a great place for youth to immerse themselves in their Jewish heritage, culture, and values. They truly get to live the rhythm of Jewish time, including Shabbat. Judaism is infused in activities throughout the day. Living in a Jewish environment 24/7 helps our kids develop a strong sense of Jewish identity.

theater productions, and more. These experiences lead to the development of increased confidence and self-esteem, and skills such as teamwork, problemsolving, decision-making, and independence.

- Academic enrichment. Believe it or not, camp can have a positive impact on children once they return to school each fall! This particularly plays out in the specialty camps, where a camper can engage intensely in an area such as chemistry or creative writing. These enriching experiences stay with our youth well after the summer has ended and can offer wonderful preparation for upcoming academic studies.
- Fun and adventure. Ultimately, camp is fun! At all our camps, children participate in classic summer activities such as swimming, hiking, campfires, sports, art, and more. They have the chance to make new friends and create lasting memories. Perhaps most importantly, they will be challenged to try new things and step outside of their comfort zones in a healthy, supportive environment.

Elections 2023

While most attention is on the Presidential election a year from now, we can't forget that there are local elections in November. As the saying goes, "All politics are local." These are important elections that affect people's daily lives. If you live in the City of Miami Beach or the City of Miami, you likely have been hearing about these elections. The City of Miami Beach and City of Miami elections are Tuesday, November 7. The last day to register to vote for these elections is October 10. Any runoff would be Tuesday, November 21. All Miami-Dade residents should have received new voter identification cards in August. To register to vote or change your voter registration, go to www.miamidade.gov/global/elections and click "Register to Vote." Early voting for Miami is October 28- November 5; for Miami Beach, it is October 23-November 5. On election day you must vote at your precinct listed on your voter identification card.

Did you know that due to recent changes in Florida law, all vote-by-mail ballot applications expired on Jan. 1, 2023? If you previously voted by mail, you are no longer registered, and you must request a new vote-by-mail ballot (good for 2-years). Go to miamidade.electionsfl. org/vrservices/mbrs#. You can also call 305-499-8444. The last day to request a vote-by-mail ballot for these elections is October 28. All vote-by-mail ballots must be received by the Supervisor of Elections by 7:00pm on election day.

King Tide Event







Named Fund Highlight: David M. Dubrow Memorial Fund

David Dubrow grew up at Temple Beth Sholom and his Jewish identity was impacted tremendously by a number of his experiences as a teen in Israel. In 2013, David passed away tragically and his loving parents, Caron and Neil, established a fund in his memory. Now, 10 years later, the fund continues to be a dedicated perpetual scholarship fund with the goal of providing the opportunity for TBS teens with financial need to participate in Israel-based programs. This fund is also used to support and sustain our 11th and 12th grade Israel Fellowship. Thank you to the Dubrow family and their community of friends for honoring David's memory in this way.

As of the end of the past fiscal year, the fund balance was \$346,751. The fund is now the third largest of the named funds in the Temple's Glickstein Foundation. Over \$78,000 in scholarships have been distributed to an expanding list of worthwhile and impactful teen experiences in Israel.

The current list of programs includes:
