A Place to Belong

This summer I did a lot of reading about the crisis of loneliness around our country. The Surgeon General Vivek Murthy spoke about it as an "epidemic" in the New York Times: "At any moment, about one out of every two Americans is experiencing measurable levels of loneliness. This includes introverts and extroverts, rich and poor, and younger and older Americans. Sometimes loneliness is set off by the loss of a loved one or a job, a move to a new city, or health or financial difficulties—or a once-in-a-century pandemic. Other times, it's hard to know how it arose but it's simply there. One thing is clear: Nearly everyone experiences it at some point."

Murthy's point is well taken. All of us have had the feeling of loneliness at one time or another – whether it's from being left out, grief, or displacement and isolation. Left unattended, these feelings have both a physical and psychological impact, including increased risk of dementia and heart disease, and even an increase in the risk of premature death by 26 – 29%, as much as smoking 15 cigarettes a day!

I was fascinated by a recent article entitled, "If Loneliness Is an Epidemic, How Do We Treat It?" (NY Times, July 16, 2023). The author, who has studied loneliness extensively, Eleanor Cummins, concurs with Dr. Murthy; if you're feeling lonely, "go to the doctor." I have no doubt that doctors have a number of tools in their arsenal to combat loneliness, from prescriptions for pills, talk therapy, exercise and more. But attending synagogue regularly is another salient antidote to loneliness. In his report on loneliness, Murthy attests to this saying, "Religious or faithbased groups can be a source for regular social contact, serve as a community of support, provide meaning and purpose, create a sense of belonging around shared values and beliefs..."

I recently attended Torah Study with our newest Rabbi, Jessica Jacobs. Before Rabbi Jacobs started teaching, she went around the room and asked each person to share their name and why they came to Torah Study. More than half of those who were there responded that they came "for the people," they came for "their friends," they came for "companionship." Judaism stands in contrast to the heroic individualism that is celebrated in America.

We are commanded to pray in community, mourn in community and celebrate in community. Belonging to a synagogue, our synagogue, means finding the sacredness in becoming a part of something larger than ourselves. It means showing up for others in their moments of loss and despair, knowing that they will be there for you when you need them, and coming together in joy, knowing that our light will uplift all around us

Finding this kind of companionship in synagogue life requires more than "drop in" attendance. It means joining a class, becoming part of a committee that interests you, finding friends in a Panim group, or attending services regularly. There are myriad activities in which to engage that bind people together, that create the belonging-ness we are so craving. This is one area which I am certain will never be co-opted by Artificial Intelligence.

Soon, we will be sitting together to usher in the new year of 5784. We will be surrounded by others who will bring a vast variety of backgrounds and experiences with them. Some were born Jewish, others chose Judaism. Some were raised in Miami, others have joined us from all around the globe. Some grew up at Temple Beth Sholom, and others will be with us for the first time (please make sure to welcome Cantor Porat and Rabbi Jacobs!) Some will bring sadness or loss with them, others will be kvelling over a new child or grandchild. And yet despite our wide range of experiences and orientations, we all share a connection. We are coming together to be part of something bigger than ourselves, to reconnect with the traditions of our ancestors, to transcend the ordinary and become part of the sacred and to renew ourselves and our commitments for the new year.

May we feel that sense of kinship and community, that sense of belonging, not only on the High Holy Days, but whenever we enter the synagogue. The Jewish philosopher Martin Buber said, "All real living is meeting." Let us meet each other here, and together, ground our lives in purpose and meaning.

Wishing all of you a sweet new year of blessings and belonging.

Access for Current 2023-2024 Members:

High Holy Day admission is a benefit to current 2023-2024 members. If you have already renewed your annual commitment or have begun payment installments, thank you. Your continued annual commitment is tax-deductible. To renew your annual commitment today over the phone, please contact me at (305) 538-7231, ext. 230 or craig@tbsmb.org.

Non-Members, Non-Transferrable Admission, and IDs:

In our commitment to fostering a close-knit community, we strive to maintain an intimate and meaningful atmosphere during our High Holy Day services. We do not sell admission to non-members and QR codes are non-transferable. Please bring I.D.'s when checking in for each service. This decision allows us to prioritize the experience of our valued members, and keep our community safe. Each individual adult member in the household and their eligible family members aged 25 and younger in the same household are entitled to entrance. Family members aged 26 and older should have their own temple membership, which is a nominal fee for young adults. If a current 2023-2024 member wishes to purchase

additional seats for their non-member guests, admission is \$360 per person for both holidays, but only if seating capacity of current members permits this. This decision will be one week prior to the date of service.

High Holy Day Admission QR Codes:

To streamline the process and ensure a seamless experience for our members, we will soon be issuing High Holy Day QR codes only to all current 2023-2024 members. These QR codes will serve as your entry pass to each of the services.

Social Justice

I cannot believe it has been a year since I started at TBS. The Social Justice Network accomplished so much in the past year, from Mitzvah Day and the Soup Contest to nine Direct Service Projects. We also started working with RAC-FL to protect reproductive rights in Florida and we will continue that work through 2024. We have raised almost \$11,000 for PACT this year and we continue to raise funds through the end of December. Our climate change and sustainability campaign are in full swing, and you will start to see changes around campus to bring us closer to achieving zero waste. This year we will have some new projects, such as working with Buddy System MIA on their new North Beach community refrigerator and correctional facility visits with Exchange for Change.

One of the most gratifying accomplishments is when someone, especially a young person, approaches us and has an idea for a project. This is what happened when Karli Breslow and Hannah Linder approached me about collecting luggage for kids in foster care, by partnering with the non-profit Kids in Distress. Children in foster care often must move by taking their belongings in pillowcases or garbage bags. Hannah and Karli set up a place in the Welcome Center and made posters for the collection; then they began getting the word out to our members. Through their amazing efforts, they were able to collect over 200 pieces of luggage from TBS members and friends! This helps bring some dignity to the kids in foster care. Their donations were immediately put to great use by a child joining her relatives in New York. It meant a lot that she could make the trip with a set of matching luggage to carry her belongings as she transitioned out of foster care. So many of us take these types of things for granted, but the sense of "normalcy" she experienced is a confident foundation for her future!

One of the directors from Kids in Distress reported that "it was an absolute pleasure to meet all of you [Hannah, Karli and parents] and to put faces to the names. The young women did a tremendous job with this drive. So many of our foster youth will benefit from this, being able to transition to their forever homes with dignity! Karli & Hannah should be very proud of themselves"! We are indeed very proud of Hannah, Karli, and all of the TBS community.

Our next Social Justice Network meeting is on Tuesday, September 5 at 7:00 pm in the Board Room.



These programs will offer age appropriate *Tefilot* so that our youth community can pray together and learn some of the High

Holy Day liturgy and melodies. We will also engage in programming that will help our elementary-age learners explore the meaning of these holidays. I hope your children will join us so we can celebrate these sacred days in community together!

Outside of jLAB and our Youth High Holy Day Experiences, here are some activities you can do with your children at home to prepare for the High Holy Days:

- Read books about the High Holy Days. There are many great books available; we have some in our Sandra Mordujovich Memorial Children's Library, located on the landing of the second floor in the school wing.
- Talk to your children about the importance of forgiveness and repentance. Help them understand that everyone makes mistakes, and that it is important to ask for forgiveness and to forgive others.
- Help your children create a list of things that they are grateful for.
 This can be a great way for them to focus on the positive things in their lives.
- Enjoy a festive meal as a family to celebrate Rosh Hashanah.
- Fast on Yom Kippur. Though our young children are not expected to fast for the entire day, perhaps forgoing something simple like a snack can help them feel a sense of connection to an important aspect of this day.

I hope these activities will help you and your children prepare for and observe the High Holy Days, and that you make the most of this special time of year. May this be a time of reflection, renewal, and hope for all.
