Sacred Connections

Rabbi Gayle Pomerantz

Sermon delivered by Rabbi Pomerantz on Friday, November 17

I came home this morning from a five-day emergency rabbis' mission to Israel. There were 17 rabbis from Miami altogether, including me and Rabbi Glickstein. The purpose of our mission was to give *hizuk*, as the rabbis call it, strengthening, to our Israeli family. But the truth is, I came away strengthened – yes, still devastated, frustrated, angry and worried, but incredibly inspired, awed and even exhilarated by what I witnessed.

One of the recurring themes of our trip and of Jewish life in general is resiliency – Rebbe Nachman of Bratslav, who is well known to us by his famous words, "Kol haolam kulo gesher tzar meod, the whole world is a narrow bridge", was a master of resiliency. At a young age he lost four children and his wife to tuberculosis. And his house burned down. Shortly after becoming engaged to his second wife, he discovered that he had tuberculosis, and he died a few years later. But despite all this he taught his disciples that it is forbidden to despair, that we need to find the hope hidden beneath it.

Before leaving on my trip, I read an article by Tracy Frydberg, who spoke about the concept of the Jewish people needing to build an Iron Dome of resilience. I must tell you, I witnessed the profound resiliency of Israelis first-hand on this mission. On the Black Shabbat of October 7th, as it's come to be known, when Israeli reservists were called to duty, 152% of them showed up. How does that happen? How do you exceed 100%?

It means that not only the reservists who were called showed up, but those who weren't called. They came from all over the world, from Thailand and India and London. And those who couldn't serve in battle showed up to donate blood, so much so that people had to be turned away, and they showed up and are still coming to tend to agricultural fields which have been abandoned, and to feed soldiers and care for the thousands of displaced kibbutzniks and children from border towns like Sderot.

In Israel we met with so many people who shared gut wrenching stories of loss and terror, and yet despite their suffering, there was a sense of resolve and purpose. We met Rabbi Shmuel Slotki, who in his gentle way told us about his two sons, Yishai who was 24 years old and Noam who was 31, who were neighbors of one another in Beersheba. On October 7th, the moment they got word of what was happening nearby, they left their wives and children, grabbed their pistols and head toward the massacre. Rabbi Slotki took care to tell us that at any point along the way they could have changed their minds and turned back, but they didn't. Video footage from Kibbutz Alumim shows that they fought the terrorists with one other lone soldier for forty minutes, just the three of them, killing many, but by 10:30 am, they were both dead.

We saw their fresh graves at Har Herzl, the military cemetery, buried side by side, just as they fought. And though Rabbi Slotki had

the unspeakable tragedy of burying two sons on the same day, he shared that when people ask him if he's angry at God, he tells them "no", his sons chose to defend their home and their country. He said that he will only be angry if their deaths are in vain. Israelis must take their grief and channel it, he said, into a mission to rebuild Israel as a "big tent" of Jewish identity that is inclusive and a new atmosphere of unity. He spoke with a calmness of purpose and clarity of vision that was humbling to witness.


And unbelievably enough, the story of his sons is not unique. I heard about another young soldier, Jonathan Elzari, who was home for the holiday on *kibbutz ofakim* without a weapon. When he heard the terrorists outside, he took his pocket-knife, put some rocks in a sock and went out to defend his home. We saw his memorial as well.

And we met Uri, a young, soft-spoken soldier, in the hospital, who was a gunner in a tank in the North when they were hit by a Hezbollah rocket. When he tried to get out of the gunner's seat and couldn't, he realized his leg had been blown off. One other soldier in the tank was also injured and when Uri found a box of mango juice near his seat to prevent him from losing consciousness, he shared it with his injured tank mate.

The stories transcend the battlefield into civilian life in Israel Some of you are familiar with the organization, Brothers in Arms, *Achim l'Neshek*, who were the military reservists who organized the months' long protests against Netanyahu's right-wing coalition, undermining Israel's democracy. And even though they had threatened to not serve this government, they showed up, both in the air and battlefield and in service. They were the first on the ground to organize food and shelter for the more than 200,000 displaced Israelis; drove more than 8000 soldiers to their units in the first 3 days of the war; collected military gear that was lacking; started the first missing person's center; and are providing emotional support to a traumatized nation.

We met with Gigi Levy-Weiss, the visionary behind this operation, a high-tech entrepreneur, who sees this as the opportunity to partner with organizations around Israel with diverse orientations to build unity, and with the United States to repair the fissures that have emerged between American Jews and Israel. They now no longer call themselves Brothers in Arms, but rather *Achim v'Achiot l'Yisrael*, Brothers and Sisters for Israel.

We also met with survivors of the massacre at Kibbutz Kfar Aza and heard their testimonies: 13-year-old R'nana, a father named Oded whose sister in-law was taken hostage, and a mother named Rotem, who hid with her two children for 32 hours before they were rescued. Eight of those hours were spent with the terrorists in their home, eating their food, threatening them, but ultimately walking

I recently read the book *Good Inside* by Dr. Becky Kennedy. The most important take away for me was a phrase she refers to, "Two things are true." This explains that we do not have to choose between two supposedly oppositional realities. The ability to accept multiple realities at once is critical to healthy relationships. Sometimes we are so fixated on trying to understand and make things certain, we miss half the picture.

Our school vision states, "the Innovative School of Temple Beth Sholom is a Reggio-inspired Jewish community dedicated to joyful learning." As a school whose guiding principle is based on "joyful learning," we understand that sometimes it is hard for some to fully believe that if children are happy at school, they are also working in an academically challenging and rigorous environment.

As a teaching community we are always learning about developmentally appropriate learner-centered education practices and why this is what our children need today and as future changemakers.

Ann Pelo calls for brave spaces in our work with each other. She writes, "In safe spaces, we expect to be free from risk, difficulty, discomfort, but when we come together amid our differences, committed to a shared life, we are sure to encounter difficulty and discomfort. We need our communities to be brave spaces—brave because we are going to be vulnerable and exposed. Brave, because we are going to take risks with each other. Brave, because there will be conflict, discomfort, and rigorous challenge."

On the first day of our in-service week before the start of school the elementary staff reads the following poem together:

Together we will create brave space Because there is no such thing as a "safe space" We exist in the real world

We all carry scars, and we have all caused wounds. In this space

We seek to turn down the volume of the outside world,

We amplify voices that fight to be heard elsewhere, We call each other to more truth and love We have the right to start somewhere and continue to grow. We have the responsibility to examine what we think we know.
We will not be perfect.
This space will not be perfect.
It will not always be what we wish it to be But
It will be our brave space together, and
We will work on it side by side.

This sets the tone for our collaborative work throughout the year. The one thing we are certain of is that we will have times of uncertainty and that is ok-two things are true. We will be challenged, uncomfortable and uncertain and we will be joyful in our work with our children.

At the beginning of this new year, I am reminded that with the joy of the return to school and reuniting with families after a long break there is also uncertainty. Partnering with families is a huge responsibility and opportunity—Two things are true! I remain curious as we create the conditions to explore the interests, social, emotional, and physical considerations of a child in addition to their academic success. Of course, academic skills are important, AND they are not the only thing that matters. We are interested in helping children be good learners and good people! Two things are true. Academic skills are important and that is not the whole story. What we need to also consider is in what context and for what purpose do they matter.

We recently embarked on creating a learner profile which establishes the outcomes of each Innovative School graduate to be an empowered learner, an empathetic citizen, a creative problem solver, an effective communicator, and a constructive collaborator in an authentic, personalized and competency-based environment.


May this year's Mitzvah Day be filled with blessings as we learn, grow, and connect on this journey of spiritual discovery together.

Genesis 32:10-11

Then Jacob said, "O God of my father Abraham's and God of my father Isaac's [house], O Adonai who said to me, 'Return to your homeland and I will deal bountifully with you'!

קַטֹנְתִּי מָכְּל הַחָסָדִיםׂ וּמָכָּל־הָאֱמֶּת אֲשָׁר עָשִׂיתָ אָת־עַבְדֵּךְ כֵּי בְמַקְלִי עַבַּרְתִּיֹ אָת־הַיַּרְדֵּן הַזְּה וְעַתָּה הָיִיתִי לשני מחָנוֹת:

I am unworthy of all the kindness that You have so steadfastly shown Your servant: with my staff alone I crossed this Jordan, and now I have become two camps."

In this week's portion, *Vayishlach*, Jacob returns home to face his twin brother Esau after 20 years in exile. The verses I just chanted are part of a prayer a seemingly terrified Jacob is offering when word gets out that Esau, Jacob's estranged brother of 20 years, is approaching with 400 men.

As I stand here before you today, gathered in this sacred space, I am echoing Jacob's words. As a descendant of our ancestors Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah, I am—we are—the inheritors of a rich and vibrant tradition that has shaped our lives and continues to guide us. And within this tradition, throughout my personal journey, captivated by the power of music to evoke emotions, inspire action, and forge a deep connection with the divine, I've been continuously inspired to cultivate a sense of home—not simply by returning to a physical place, but by reconnecting with something deeper, something that lies within us all. By rediscovering our values, our beliefs, our sense of belonging time and time again.

In having reached this moment of my installation, with formative stops in Israel and Germany, at the Yeshiva in Netanyah and Architecture school in Aachen, Cantorial school in Berlin, Jewish communities throughout Germany, Congregation Beth Chayim Chadashim in Los Angeles and so many guiding relationships, places and experiences, I take inspiration from Jacob's prayer, because in it he reveals a profound sense of humility—a quality that resonates deeply for me in this moment.

Yes, so many of my choices and actions have been mine—throughout my journey there have been many times I've acted from a self-reliance mode, often on my own, doing my best to control and reach my goal without the help of anyone. It is, however, in acknowledging my dependence on a higher power, on the divine image that's within every person in my past and present that has been there for me, that has gently, subtly, as well as powerfully made an impact and left an imprint on me,

that I find strength.

Beyond the realm of personal struggles, the power of humility delves into the broader context of human relationships.

Later in our Torah Portion, Jacob decides to not turn away but rather advance towards Esau, bowing low to the ground seven times, in supplication or *anavah*/humility.

It is this action of humility that encourages Esau to run towards Jacob, embracing and kissing him.

The reunited twins weep in each other's arms, and Esau inquires as to the meaning of the people and gifts Jacob has sent his way.

In this intimate, vulnerable moment, Jacob witnesses in his twin's face not an enemy, not an Other, but the Divine Presence. Imbued with this awareness, Jacob is free to offer Esau a blessing, perhaps the very blessing he had wrestled deceitfully from Esau.

In thinking about our siblings in the state of Israel, as well as all inhabitants of the land of Israel, I can't help but pray and hope for leadership on both sides that will know to utilize humility as a bridge, connecting us to one another and fostering a sense of shared humanity. It is through humility that we can break down barriers, heal wounds, foster a more harmonious and just world, create a space for reconciliation and understanding and acknowledge that we are all in need of forgiveness and grace.

With a sense of humility, gratitude, and homecoming, I feel deeply blessed to be installed as your Cantor tonight. I stand before you with a deep-seated commitment to upholding the traditions of Temple Beth Sholom while also embracing the innovative spirit that has always defined this community and the Reform movement at large. I offer you the vision of a synagogue where music serves as a unifying force, drawing us together in shared prayer, celebration, meaning-making and learning—a sanctuary where melodies resonate with the souls of every individual, in humble recognition of one another's strengths and talents, a singing community that fosters a sense of belonging and connection that transcends generations.

To the members of Temple Beth Sholom, I pledge my heart and soul to serving you as your cantor. I am here to listen to your needs and find ways to meet them, to celebrate your joys, and to offer comfort in times of sorrow. I am here to share the beauty and depth of Jewish music with you, to elevate your spirits through song, and to create a space for your soul and to connect with you.



Through their leadership and the participation of our entire community, Temple Beth Sholom collected 3,884 diapers, 5,256 wipes, ten cans of formula, and many other baby needs. Our community also donated over \$1,000 which will enable the Miami Diaper Bank to purchase another 5,661 diapers. Overall, we contributed 9,545 diapers and served 191 babies in need in our community.

On November 1 our 4th and 5th grade learners met with TBS member Roberto Schaechter, founder of the Miami Diaper Bank, Adam Snitzer, board member, and Gabriela Rojas, executive director, along with Rabbi Jessica Jacobs. 

In December we hosted two gift-wrapping events: one for our Middle School Students and one for High School Students. Our teens brought in gifts for donations, and we spent time organizing and wrapping them. Our elementary youth groups, Mini (3rd-5th Grade) and Micro BESHTY (K-2nd Grade), were also involved with our Toy Drive. During our Mini/Micro BESHTY Chanukah Celebration our participants made holiday cards to accompany our toy donations. In total, we donated over 120 toys to Miami Rescue Mission this year. All our BESHTY participants had a fantastic time giving back and bringing light during the holiday season!

away. These people are displaced and traumatized but they are not immobilized. They are trying to figure out their future, and are already fundraising to build back better and care for each other.

We also visited two hospitals, one in the South where we learned that incubators had been sent to Gaza, and Shaare Zedek Hospital in Jerusalem where we met with Rabbi Doctor Avram Steinberg, who leads the medical ethics team there and is so renowned for his service that he has won the Israel Prize. He shared with us many of the *halakhic* and ethical concerns that face a Jewish hospital in a time of war, including whether a patient can refuse care from an Arab doctor - the answer is no - and whether the hospital should give medical attention to terrorists - the answer is yes - for many reasons, including upholding our ethics in the world's eyes. It was amazing to see how these gut-wrenching decisions are made through the lens of Jewish ethics and law.

Even in a time of atrocities and war we do not abandon our morality.

I want to share one other story, which is somewhat gruesome, but really struck me so deeply because it speaks of the profound commitment Israelis have to one another.

On Tuesday afternoon, we spent time at the military morgue in Israel, a place I have never visited before. This is the place where soldiers who have died are taken for identification and preparation for burial. On October 7th and every day since then, they have worked around the clock and had to divide the facility in two and expand into the parking lot to also handle all of the civilian casualties. I learned that when a soldier enters the army, their blood and fingerprints are taken, and x-rays of their teeth for this very purpose of being able to identify them if they die in the line of duty. Imagine a 17 or 18-year-old undergoing this procedure knowing full well why they are doing so.

Usually, if someone is burned, traces of their DNA can be found for identification. But after October 7th, there were bones of two bodies that were so charred they couldn't be identified. We met with a man named Aviyad who flew with these remains all the way to Dover, Delaware for an even more sensitive DNA testing system and there, their identities became clear. That's the extent to which Israelis will go to honor those who have died.

And finally, though we began our trip in tears, we ended in laughter, visiting with a group of recent Ethiopian immigrant children who have been displaced from their absorption center by the war. Even as the war is raging, the Jewish Agency is receiving three times the number of calls from people interested in Aliyah because of rising antisemitism around the world.

For all these reasons and more, so many more, I came away from Israel inspired.

Yes, there is still rage and fear and uncertainty and blame that is still unfolding, but the Israeli people themselves have risen up to meet the moment. And now we must too.

When I first read the article about the Iron Dome of Jewish resilience, I loved Fryder's image of the Iron Dome. But after being there, the image no longer works for me and here's why. As many

of you know, the purpose of the Iron Dome is to prevent a missile from impact. If it works as it should, the target remains untouched. But historically, and here again in Israel, Jewish resiliency and transformation comes when there's been traumatic impact, yet we allow that impact to transform us and strengthen us to build a better future. This is tragic but true. After the trauma impacts us physically, we must allow it to impact who we are. Over and over again, I heard Israelis who want to make sure they use this horror to unite and grow stronger.

And we are part of this equation. There can be no strong Israel without Diaspora Jews, and there can be no strength and power for Diaspora Jews without Israel.

So we are in this together.

Rebbe Nachman once taught: "if you believe you can damage, then believe you can heal." We see the damage that hate has caused. If Israelis are able to transcend that hate after what's been done to them, then we, too, cannot dwell in the land of revenge and retribution. Our mission must be to join them in the effort to come together, with differences but united. Let us continue to find ways to help them serve and rebuild through donations. Please keep on giving - the needs are so great. Give to the Federation's Israel Emergency Fund which is doing critical work. Give to the Brothers and Sisters for Israel, to the Israeli Movement for Progressive Judaism, which is helping to house and feed displaced people, and dozens of other organizations doing meaningful life-saving work. We can help through volunteering, through visiting Israel when you're able and through reconsidering the depth, necessity, and strength of our partnership. The brilliance of resilience Is forcing a transformation for the good.

So let us follow the lead of our Israeli family and find reason to hope, the desire to unite, and the will to work for a better tomorrow.
