Sacred Connections

For more than 20 years, Temple Beth Sholom's Innovative School (preschool and elementary levels) have been modeled after the Reggio Emilia school system in Italy.

Anyone reading this who has had a child attend our school knows what a rich and grounding educational and developmental experience it is. The Reggio Emilia educational philosophy was born on the heels of WWII, when Italian society was struggling to recover from the devastation and brutality of the war. Out of the rubble, a group of committed parents, factory workers and farm laborers who had bonded in solidarity during the war chose to build a new early childhood school brick by brick. Their intention was to liberate the children from parochial schools and government schools which privileged the wealthy and create a place where each child was valued regardless of their economic circumstances.

What was extraordinary was how members of the community came together in pursuit of this dream, even if they had no young children of their own. As in the building of the ancient tabernacle in the book of Exodus, with Israelites contributing whatever they could from their hearts, the people of Reggio Emilia contributed everything from local hunters donating their game to the school cafeteria to collecting paper and scrap metal to raise funds. The vision was for the schools to not be simply day care centers, but rather "...incubators of new free, democratic citizens who were capable of self-determination in their practical and idealistic choices."

Another unique aspect of the Reggio Emilia Schools was the partnership between parents, teachers and children. They were all considered co-authors of the educational project. In fact, the whole community continues to be invested in the school and in creating a civic sense of belonging and contributing to a collective society. It is this aspect of the Reggio Emilia philosophy that inspired our Head of School, Margie Zeskind, to propose that we appoint a Council at TBS to study the way Reggio Emilia has created a culture of belonging and mutual responsibility in their community which emanates from the school in order to learn from

their best practices as a synagogue community.

I am happy to share that we have established such a Council and named it Project *Echad* (One) to help us to create the ideal integrated community. The Council is comprised of lead educational and temple staff, clergy, and lay leaders, parents and teachers. Throughout this year we will be meeting, reading, learning and discussing how we might build a covenantal community with a deep interdependent relationship between our Innovative School families and temple members, with each participant feeling a strong sense of belonging to the whole community. We will be guided by an Israeli expert who has worked with Reggio Emilia for years and who will be joining us in Miami to deepen our learning.

In many critical ways, we are already a synagogue with relationships at the center, modeled by our Panim el Panim small group initiative, by our warm and hospitable *Ulam HaShalom*, Welcome Center, and our vibrant community activities like Mitzvah Day and our Joseph production. But we know there is more for us to discover about building a community where we learn from each other, challenge each other, and commit to one another.

As we embark on this journey of learning and growth, I feel a sense of excitement to be charting a path in synagogue life, which will enable us to see ourselves through new eyes and find fresh ways for us to cocreate our Jewish spiritual home. We will update you on our learning as we proceed throughout the year.

Welcome back from summer travels and fun. We hope that the year ahead is your best yet at Temple Beth Sholom. Please let us know in what way you would like to become more integrated into your synagogue community.

This month, we transition our Torah reading to the book of *D'varim* (Deuteronomy). The book and Torah portion begin with the phrase, "elu ha'd'varim" or "these are the words," which Moses spoke to the people of Israel. Those words, "elu ha'd'varim" are echoed in our morning service, when we recite "elu ha'dvarim" – these are the things, "she'ein lahem shiur" – that have no measure. That turn of phrase is Talmudic, and it lists the actions that "have no measure" – welcoming the stranger, visiting the sick, celebrating with a wedding couple, burying the dead, and so on. These are not the acts of the individual. They are the act of the community.

Like so many institutions, community is one of those invisible forces in our lives that we don't realize we need until we really see its power. The depth of its power reveals itself in moments of crisis, joy, and trauma. Its power during a *shiva* call or a collective *kaddish*. Its power during a *l'chaim* at a child's wedding, or an outpouring of support during a tragedy. Its power as we see our grandchildren run down the hallways of the building that we built, together.

We are immeasurably blessed to have TBS as the cornerstone of our Jewish community. Like so many things, the strength of this foundation was not accidental. It was painstakingly built through the dedication of our clergy, our exceptional staff and our committed lay leadership. 2024 Primary Elections

As summer continues, all eyes are on the 2024 election season, which kicks-off this month with the primaries on Tuesday, August 20. For the primary election, Florida has closed elections, meaning that, in most cases, only registered voters with a political party affiliation may vote for candidates from that party. Democrats vote in the Democratic primary; Republicans vote in Republican primary. That applies to all races for Congress, the Florida state legislature, county sheriff and other partisan offices. Registered independents can only vote in non-partisan races. All registered voters can also vote in non-partisan races in Miami-Dade County for county judges, school board members, county mayor, county commissioners, community council members, and community development district seats. For the first time in decades, residents of Miami-Dade County will elect a sheriff and supervisor of elections.

Important dates you need to know:

Vote by Mail – ALL REGISTERED VOTERS must renew their vote-by-mail ballots in 2024. Even if you have in the past voted by mail, that registration has expired, and you must apply again for all 2024 elections. We urge all voters to order a vote-by-mail ballot even if you plan to vote in person early or on election day. You never know what may happen and it is good to have the mail ballot, even if you ultimately do not use it.

 The deadline to request a vote-by-mail ballot for the August 20 primary is Thursday, Aug. 8. Apply at miamidade.electionsfl. org/vrservices/mbrs# . All vote-by-mail ballots must be received by the Supervisor of Election no later than 7 pm on election night.

Traveling in August? Receive your Vote-by-Mail Ballot at a different location. Many people will be away during the election and wish their vote-by-mail ballot to be sent to an address other than their home residence in Miami-Dade. As of April 17, 2024, per Florida Statute, requests for a vote-by-mail ballot to be mailed to an address not on file, must be in writing and signed by the voter using the DS-DE 160 Statewide Vote-by-Mail Request form. To complete your request, please fill out, print, and sign the form, which you can print from here bit.ly/3zhwgZX. You must return the form to the Miami-Dade Elections Department by mail, fax, or email as an attachment. Mail: P.O. BOX 521250, Miami FL 33152, Fax: 305-499-8401, Email: votebymail@miamidade.gov

Early Voting - In Miami-Dade County, early voting begins on Monday, Aug. 5, and closes on Sunday, Aug. 18. The hours for voting change depending on the day, so check the full calendar

before heading out to the polls.

Election day – On election day, August 20, you may only vote at your assigned precinct as shown on your voter's registration card. Please check carefully as many precincts have changed.

You can learn about early voting locations and times, check your voter status, read a sample ballot based on your location, find your local polling place, and learn more at www.miamidade.gov/global/elections/ home.page or using the QR code at right.

Yes on 4 Campaign. We continue to work toward passage of Amendment 4 in November, which will protect reproductive rights in Florida through a Constitutional Amendment. Message from our Sister Congregation in Israel

Dear Friends.

Brothers and sisters!

What's gonna become of our Am Yisrael (The people of Israel)? It's not completely up to us. Our homeland is under attack both physically and ideologically. I'm sure that some of you feel alarmed, frustrated and confused—as well as surprised by a war that goes on and on and has unexpectedly produced generational rifts within many families of diaspora Jewry. How are you dealing with all this? Just as you are concerned about us, we are sincerely concerned about you. Now more than ever, we must maintain our common sense of Peoplehood. We have faced formidable challenges since the beginning of the modern era, when Jews had to declare if they were "enlightened and cultured" and become Christians or "dark and primitive" and stay Jewish. Back then the anti-Semitic propaganda was against our faith and was influenced by fear of our homelessness. These days it is against our right to a homeland.

How did we get here? I guess it's human nature—what can I say...but don't let people confuse you: Remaining loyal to our people doesn't demand a closed mind or blind acceptance of everything. Ever since its inception, Reform Judaism has emphasized the intellectual autonomy of the individual Jew. And this certainly holds true concerning policies of the current Israeli government. As Reform Jews we educate to maintain our traditions and sense of peoplehood-while adopting as well the principles of humanism and modern thought. We also stand committed to

the lessons of our historic experience, including our ultimate vulnerability in the absence of a land of our own.

Do we not have a right to exist? Jewish statehood is not a hypothetical issue. There are approximately eight million Jews living here whose lives would be seriously endangered should there arise a single state "from the river to the sea." The lives of seven million Palestinians would be similarly threatened. One can effectively defend Israel's right to exist on a theoretical level, but the issue has been eclipsed by historical reality. Dogmatic critics can ignore the irresponsible ramifications of "the river to the sea" slogan. People with intellectual and moral integrity cannot. Serious Jews certainly cannot do so. On October 7th we were monstrously attacked.

Some may deny reality by articulating that "It's all a matter of context." I'm appalled by that assertion. It can be employed to justify any act of mass violence, such as the attack on the World Trade Center and other well-known atrocities.

I'm a peace activist—I believe that this is the only key to a righteous and sane future. Wrongs were committed by both sides over the years. We can either seek to destroy one another or decide to live side by side. The latter must become our destiny.

It is more important than ever to impart to our children and grandchildren an appreciation of the rich history of the Jewish people, including the state of Israel. As among other peoples, there are problematic elements in our heritage and we dare not close our eyes to them. But those who demand to reshape our heritage around these points of contention are seeking in effect to destroy its vitality. We don't deny the legitimacy of criticism but insist that it not obscure the essence of our historical narrative—just as the acceptance of Biblical criticism didn't lead us to abandon the Biblical text. No people should accept such a self-destructive approach to its heritage.

We Jews demand as others the inalienable right to live and prosper. Nonetheless, concern for the human rights of others remains a vital part of our tradition. We affirm, even at times such as this, that there is no contradiction between the two. But we will not allow ourselves to be maneuvered into "understanding" the cheap attacks upon all that we hold dear, even in the guise of "unimpeachable progressive values." Should I apologize as an Israeli for not having a death wish? How can people of integrity honestly believe that we counter-attacked in Gaza in order to engage in "genocide?" Sinwar thrives on the suffering of his people and cynically refuses to accept a U.S.-brokered deal involving the release of the hostages, ignoring the basic needs and wishes of his people—yet public opinion blames "the Zionists"...

There is nothing more that I and the vast majority of Israelis want than ending this war, but we won't shrink from our responsibility to liberate the hostages and secure our borders—our lives.

"May God bring peace to the people of Israel and to the entire world."

The Diller Teen Tikkun Olam Awards and the Helen Diller Family Foundation are pleased to announce the 2024 cohort of Awardees! These 15 extraordinary teen leaders are innovating and driving change in their communities and around the world - at a time when we need it most.

While Jonathan was serving as the captain of the first-ever Miami Beach Senior High School robotics team, he knew he wanted to provide opportunities for elementary students from low-income homes to learn coding and robotics.

He developed an idea to engage high school students in mentoring younger students, and

pitched this proposal to the Mayor and Commissioners of the City of Miami Beach. They enthusiastically agreed to sponsor the project through a free summer camp, and Helping Hands MB was born.

Jonathan recruited bilingual volunteer camp instructors to work one-on-one with students on activities that build STEAM skills and confidence. Many volunteers were first-generation and immigrant students who created an instant rapport with younger camp attendees, many of whom had recently arrived from South and Central America. As of July 2024, more than 1,200 students in grades 3-12 had participated in a Helping Hands MB project with guidance from 120 volunteers. In a participant survey, 75% of students said they liked science more since starting





the program.

TBS Justice League alumna Stella McLaney received the Diller Teen Tikkun Olam Award for co-founding S.A.F.E. (Students Advocating Fentanyl Education) with Gabrielle Lieberman to educate teens about the dangers of the fentanyl crisis. In their work, S.A.F.E. has stocked Narcan to over 300 Miami Dade Public Schools and involved over 60 teen ambassadors, including many of our teens here at TBS. We are so proud of Stella's commitment to making the world a better place through health and safety education.

Avinu Malkeinu Monday, September 30, 7:00 pm




