## **Sacred Connections**

The most important thing happening in our country this month is **Election Day, November 5**. We are once again hoping to be a 100% voting congregation. Many of our members have worked tirelessly for the passage of Amendment 4, guaranteeing reproductive choice to protect women's health and autonomy. Thank you to Myra Spindel, Robin Straus, and Barbara Gelber for leading us in this effort, along with Rabbi Jacobs and Jeff Agron. I am proud that our congregation has played a leadership role for the Reform Jews of Florida (RAC FL) in pressing for this important protection, in keeping with our Jewish value of women's health and our American value of separation of Church and State. **Voting is the most important action you can take this month.** 

Another highlight happening this November is welcoming Rabbi Yael Katz, a Reform Rabbi from Israel, who will be joining us for two weeks this Fall (Nov. 1 – 12) and ten days this Spring (March 13 – 23). Rabbi Katz will be coming as part of the Golden Hanassi Fellowship of Israel's Movement for Progressive Judaism (IMPJ) to strengthen the ties between Israeli and American Reform Rabbis and to mentor young Israeli Rabbis.

We are delighted to be welcoming Rabbi Katz, who was recently ordained and currently serves as the Head of Community and Educational Activities of Israel's Reform Movement. Yael is not only a rabbi, but she is also mother to four children, many of whom have been serving in Gaza this past year.

Even though the Hanassi Fellowship was designed for American rabbis to mentor Israeli rabbis, I know that Rabbi Katz will have much to teach us about our flourishing Reform Movement in Israel and what the past year has been like for her community. Through many years of hard work and leadership, the Reform Movement has gone from a time when there were only a handful of Reform congregations when I was in rabbinical school in Israel (1984-85), to today, when there are 54 congregations! As many of you know, we have a Reform partner congregation in Israel already in

Jerusalem, *Kehillat HaDror*, and our Innovative School 4th and 5th grade students collaborate with their students at the Tali School throughout the year.

This past year has been a traumatic one for all Israelis. The Reform Movement there has stepped in to fill gaps throughout the country, from finding housing to counseling and education. Some of our Reform congregations in the Gaza Envelope and the North have been upended by loss and displacement. Their rabbis have roamed throughout the country trying to support and sustain their congregants. A tragic yet historical milestone happened after October 7th, when families requested Reform rabbis to perform funerals for the fallen, rather than the Orthodox rabbis traditionally provided by the government. Yet even as the Reform Movement is growing, the current right-wing Israeli government has slashed their already limited funding in half, leaving a tremendous deficit as the Rabbis and lay leaders have done the tremendous work of providing emotional and physical support.

Please take advantage of the wonderful opportunity we will have to learn about what is happening in Israel by attending meetings and events throughout Rabbi Katz's stay with us. For more information on her availability or to host her for a coffee or meal, please contact Jeff Agron (jagron@tbsmb.org).

This month opens with an election and closes with Thanksgiving. Please vote, find an opportunity to meet Rabbi Katz, and take the time to count your blessings and feel a sense of gratitude for all that is given to us.

Dear Families,

I am reflecting on the quote above I wrote a few years ago during difficult times in our world. As I revisit my thinking, it is even more relevant today than ever before. As you are aware from our August Hakol articles about Project Echad. our community is working on a community of belonging project and looking at what happens in the Municipality of Reggio Emilia, Italy as a potential guiding light to help us develop our approach to oneness. This November marks a critical time in America as we approach election day as a divided group of Americans struggling to understand the larger community's diverse needs and address barriers to perspective-taking. November is also our time of gratitude and thankfulness as we celebrate Thanksgiving, which I view as a reflection of belonging and celebration of two distinct groups coming together, despite differences, to grow a sense of unity, gratitude, and belonging.

Children's rights are respected in the municipal early childhood centers in Reggio Emilia, Italy. Loris Malaguzzi, the philosopher behind the Reggio Emilia Approach, believed that we need to listen to our children to lead the way following the destruction of their city after World War Two. In Reggio, children, along with their families and teachers, are considered total participants in the educational process. They believe and see that it is only when children are viewed as full participants in the learning process that they have the time, space, and opportunity to develop the strategies to allow them to forge different approaches. Our world needs different approaches! In these new possibilities and ways of seeing the world, our world may ultimately be able to embrace and see differences and cognitive conflict as critically important to developing democratic and moral tenets. The educators work with the notion that when we welcome a conflict and embrace differences, our community is strengthened. With this approach, you don't know what will happen and are open to discovering solutions together. In Reggio Emilia

and here in our Innovative School, one of the pleasures of the children is that they are given the time and space to use their negotiating skills to coerce other children through their own thoughts and being coerced. Adults tend to be frustrated by the meaning of conflict. This approach affords children the opportunity to develop constructive meaning and relationships around differences. Those traits are a disposition that can change the world!

In our current state, where there is destructive conflict resulting in tragic outcomes throughout the world, so many are hoping for a safer and healthier future for our next generations. As caring parents, educators, and policymakers, we need to incorporate creative possibilities within our educational systems that afford children the time, space, and creative experiences to express their feelings, views, and theories. Loris Malaguzzi said, "If we listen to our children's voices, we will be able to see that children are able to reinvent knowledge by shaping things before things shape them. We would have the opportunity to learn a new way of seeing the world through their lens."

Here at our Innovative School – like the schools in Reggio Emilia - we are creating affective, respectful, and responsive learning environments essential to nurturing our children's listening, caring, and moral dispositions for life. May our world be blessed by their future contributions!








## Banned Book of the Month





Each month the TBS Freedom to Read taskforce will feature one of over 3,000 books banned in the state of Florida. Book bans are defined as any action taken against a book by a parent, community member, school administration or government official. Bans may result in permanent or temporary removal from school or library shelves. While South Florida counties have very few book bans, Florida leads the nation in books being challenged and banned in schools. Learn more about book bans here. **Book:** To Kill a Mockingbird Reason Banned: Racial slurs

To Kill a Mockingbird is a 1961 Pulitzer Prize winning novel written by Harper Lee. It is a coming-of-age story set in a small town in Alabama. The book describes the childhood of Scout and Jem Finch and their father, Atticus Finch. Atticus is a lawyer who defends a Black man in the community falsely accused of rape. The overall themes of the book are ones of racial prejudice and social justice. It has been banned from certain schools because some characters use racist language, and the plot focuses on an allegation of rape.





In November, we welcome Hanassi Rabbinic Fellow Rabbi Yael Katz from Israel. Temple Beth Sholom is very honored to participate in the John and Suzanne Golden Hanassi Rabbinical Fellows Program. This is an exciting opportunity to expose our congregation to the Israeli Rabbinical Program of the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion. It is also a chance for us to create lifelong ties with Israelis and their communities.

Rabbi Katz will be with us from November 1-12, 2024 (and again from March 13-23, 2025). Rabbi Katz joined the Israel Reform Movement as Head of Community and Educational Activities in October of 2022 and was ordained by the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute or Religion in Jerusalem last November. The goals of the Hanassi program are to:

- Expose Israeli rabbis and rabbinical students to American Reform congregations and Jewish communal organizations to enable and nurture a strong and lasting connection to North American Reform Jewish life.
- Allow Israeli rabbis and rabbinical students to strengthen their skills in community building, congregational management, board relations, and fundraising.
- Allow Israeli rabbis and rabbinical students to introduce the flowering of a progressive Judaism in Israel to Reform congregations and Jewish communal organizations, leading to renewed interest and support from the American Jewish community for Israel.
- Facilitate encounters in formal and informal settings that foster open communication between Israelis and American Jews, providing an opportunity for developing enduring friendships.



Professionally, Rabbi Katz has served in a range of management, content, and community development roles in such organizations as Melitz – the Institute for Jewish Zionist Education, Leo Baeck Education Center, the Israel Reform Movement, the Midrasha in Oranim, the Halutz Organization, the Megiddo Regional Council and the Jewish Agency. Rabbi

Katz initiated the establishment of the Reform Community in the Megiddo Regional Council and its related nonprofit organization.

Yael is married to Chen and is the mother of Noam, Ori, Elad, and Omer. She and her family live in Kibbutz Megiddo.

The 11th and 12th grade Israel Fellows and Justice League will be traveling to Berlin and Prague. These two cities housed much of this historical perspective on Judaism.
