Temple Beth Sholom in Numbers

For the past 18 years, my husband and I have been composting. At first it seemed like a fairly easy way to lighten our load on the planet. For many years we made our own compost, which my husband and plenty of bugs and worms transformed into compost soil. We learned the hard way that you have to remove all the sticky labels on fruit and vegetable skin. At one point, my husband had the compost remains spread all over our lawn drying out – let me assure you, it wasn't a pretty picture.

Then last year, as part of our Social Justice Network sustainability efforts, we joined Compost for Life -- many thanks to Rachel Unger for initiating this project at the Innovative School and for home use. Having our compost picked up biweekly has made our lives much easier. They are always on time and do a great job, at a discounted price for TBS members (compostforlifemiami.org). I was recently impressed with their holiday newsletter, informing me that as of December 2024, they have diverted 4,238,488 pounds of organics from landfill. I learned that my household has contributed 1,102 pounds to that effort, which is the equivalent of saving 1,003 gas miles or 45 gallons of gas! Seeing our efforts quantified this way truly validated our commitment.

This data inspired me to share some of our TBS quantitative impact with you. On an annual basis, your contributions to TBS help us to:

-100+ adults making meaning together in Panim el Panim small groups

Dear friends, this is far from a comprehensive list of our data. More importantly, quantitative data is only a single element of how to measure impact in spiritual living. It cannot calculate what is immeasurable, such as making lifelong friendships, finding meaning and purpose through Torah study and justice work, creating sacred connections in life cycle and worship, feeling a sense of awe and radiance in being an intimate part of something larger than ourselves, perpetuating Jewish traditions that have been transmitted from generation to generation, uplifting each other in times of suffering and celebrating what is good and beautiful in our lives together.

We are eminently grateful that your contributions enable us to do this holy work in partnership with you. For a taste of this magic, please make sure to join us for our 29th Mitzvah Day on February 23. *Hazak, hazak, v'nithazek* – may we go from strength to strength and strengthen each other in all that we do.

Powerful Dreamers

We all dream, but are we all powerful dreamers? I inherited my powerful dreamer nature from my father. As new Cuban non-English-speaking immigrants, we lived in Washington Heights, New York, which was not the safest place in the world in the 1970s. His first job was as an apartment building superintendent, where he had a choice: An exceedingly small apartment, half rent plus salary, or an entire basement, rent-free. Living in basements was not a desirable situation. They were roach

and rat-infested, and most people did not choose this. My father chose the basement. Before we even moved in, the roaches and rats were gone. He rebuilt the living area and added two more bathrooms. I grew up in New York City in a spacious 3-bedroom apartment with a huge den area, two ateliers, and three backyards. One was for the dog, a second yard was for the vegetable garden he planted, which even had grape

vines, and the third was reserved for the children in the building to play in. This dream, however, was not "the" powerful dream. The dream was to be able to fund private education for his daughters and to make sure subsequent generations had access to higher education. Today, though no longer with us, my father is a grandpa to grandchildren with master's degrees from very reputable universities. He was a 4th grade graduate with a powerful dream.

What differentiates powerful dreamers from regular dreamers is hard work, determination, and the ability to inspire not only themselves but others to join in their dreams. Powerful dreamers not only realize the opportunities and possibilities, but they also run with them.

When Dr. Francine Herold asked me to join in her powerful dream of transitioning our school into a Reggioinspired school, I said 'I can run with that." And as Margie Zeskind, another powerful dreamer, entered the stage to continue the transition, I wrote during a personnel self-evaluation still in my files, that "I aspired for our school to be the kind of school where others come to learn from us." At the time I wrote this, it seemed far-



fetched and ambitious. Our school was so far from what we eventually became, and our physical environment presented a big challenge. Our facility was so different from the fantastic architecture of the Reggio Schools in Italy, with their piazzas and floor-to-ceiling glass walls. This reality, however, was not a deterrent. I knew about powerful dreams and was in the company of other powerful dreamers.

Years later, the dream is now a reality. Our environment

and how our school is designed highly compliment each other and make our evolution visible. Schools visit us and look up to us for guidance and inspiration on all practices. From the way our leadership is structured to our documented and curricular practices, they all want to know how we did it. We host "Study Tours," and it is gratifying to see the same

awe and wonder in the visitors' eyes that we had when visiting other schools that were so far ahead of us on their journey.

From our most recent visitors:

"Thank you for hosting our new teachers and returning team members. They really enjoyed their visit. Carla was blown away from her mentorship time with you, and we have already put some new systems in place for the new year." Natalie Williams, Director of Education-Miami Children's Museum.

As we ascribe ourselves to being lifelong learners, our journey continues, and so does our dreaming. I have another powerful dream for our school: We will be the ambassadors that make the Reggio Emilia Approach to education available for children of all socio-economic sectors of society in South Florida. I strongly believe that this type of education should be available to all children. I powerfully believe this, so please stay tuned.

BESHTY Update

In December, our 11th and 12th grade Israel Fellows and Justice League students journeyed to Prague and Berlin to learn about the theme of Repair through the lens of the Holocaust and reparations. We studied the idea of vergangenheitsbewältigung, meaning "working off the past," Germany's attempts to right the wrongs of their painful history. On this educational journey, we toured historic synagogues and cemeteries, visited the concentration camp of Terezin, took a walking tour of Berlin to learn about the foundation of contemporary Jewish denominations, and studied countless Holocaust memorials and sites. We visited contemporary Jewish German communities to celebrate Chanukah and learn about Jewish life and antisemitism in Germany in 2024. We grappled with the modern challenges of the German government, attempting to understand how a desire to provide refuge to refugees and immigrants is changing the nature of the country. Throughout the trip, our teens reflected on the past, present, and future of Jewish peoplehood and narrative. In an attempt to summarize their learning, we asked each student to write a six-word memoir-six simple words to tell the story of what they learned. The memoirs of our students and staff are featured below:

"Resilient community reconstructed, German Jewish culture"
"Educational, cultural, beneficial, intense topics, Judaism"
"Atrocities happen often, world must change"
"The Jewish community perseveres through connection"
"Amazing learning opportunities and finding community"
"Jewish community everywhere and thrives everywhere"
"One part of a big story"
"Meeting my ancestors through walking tours"
"Rebuild so it is never again"
"Repair the broken soul of peoplehood"
"Walking where they walked years ago"
"Multifaceted view into the Jewish struggle"
"We are here, Am Israel Chai"







Book: The Perks of Being a Wallflower

Reason Banned: Sexually explicit, LGBTQIA+, profanity, mental health

The Perks of Being a Wallflower is a classic coming of age story written by Stephen Chbosky in 1999. Set in the early 1990's, the story follows protagonist Charlie's first year of high school. In a suburb near Pittsburgh, Charlie grew up and spent his whole life as a "wallflower," choosing to watch the lives of his peers from the sidelines while privately dealing with his own grief and sorrows. Everything changes by the time he reaches high school through the help of new friends and teachers who guide him through joy, friendship, love and music. *The Perks of Being a Wallflower* is one of the most commonly banned books in the United States for its "mature themes," yet it is a beautiful and heartfelt story that explores the reality of searching for your personal identity and grappling with that fact that it is always changing, as well as learning how to love.

Choosing Life

Who knows what the future might bring? A challenging question, especially if you live in the Middle East.

Our son Itamar was wounded in action on October 7th (2023), losing his best friend who was killed right next to him. He subsequently went back to Gaza to serve, fought in Lebanon as well-- and when he finished his compulsory service, was called up to the reserves. It appears that one of the factors that keeps us going is the power of Inertia.

The Prime Minister proclaimed that our goal in Gaza is "Total Victory" (i.e. the total dismantling of Hamas as a political and military force), a goal which downgrades the physical and psychological condition of our soldiers to the level of a secondary consideration. Most observers, however –within the upper echelons of the IDF as well ---are convinced that this goal is unrealistic. We can hit Hamas hard again and again but "Total victory" will never be fully achieved. As a people that suffered exile and persecution we were taught to believe that "we can only trust today" and that we should live by war and pray to G-D for peace – what future does this offer to our children and does any situation last forever?

In Psalms 127 it says:

ָהָלִוֹף יֵלֵה ו וּבָכֹה נֹשֵׂא מֶשֶׁרְ־הָ*ו*ָרַע **בּא־יָבָא** בְרְנֵה נֹשָׂא אַלַמֹּתֵיו:

He walks along, weeping, the bearer of the seed-sack — he will yet come forth in song, bearing his sheaves.

The Hebrew poet Natan Zach writes:

It is Not good for Man to be alone	לא טוב היות האדם לבדו
But he is alone	אבל הוא לבדו בין כה וכה.
When he is waiting he is alone	והוא מחכה והוא לבדו
While procrastinating he is still alone.	והוא מתמהמה והוא לבדו.
And he alone knows that even if things	והוא לבדו יודע
lingers	שגם אם יתמהמה
It will arrive, the goal will yet arrive	בוא יבוא, הוא יבוא

The pair of words *Bo Yavo* are found in the Bible to teach and remind us that the world is not waiting for us to decide when the "next step" should be taken. Things change and we should decide to which direction we want to continue.

The sun will rise - then what do we do?

We must remember that we were never here in this land by ourselves, nor has any of our wars ever proven to be the final one. So much for "Total victory"...

Negotiations must supplement every armed conflict with our enemies. They are, in fact, an expression of our Will to Live. There is no magical formula for their success. They are harsh with many ups and downs but are the only instrument for avoiding additional violence.

The transliteration of the Hebrew word for violence is *Alimut* from the linguistic root of *Aleph, Lamed, Mem*; these three Hebrew letters also spell speechlessness. Perhaps the lesson to learn is that when we can't negotiate, we are forced to choose violence. But clever *midrashim* are not enough. Leaders unwilling to choose forms of co-existence are risking the future of their people.

May we have the courage to seek for Peace


Many donations to the temple are exempt from gift and estate taxes and may even have capital gains and income tax benefits.
