# **Sacred Connections**

This month marks the beginning of the critically important World Zionist Congress Elections which are held once every 5 years. Five years ago, I was privileged to be a member of the World Zionist Congress, although unfortunately we could not assemble in person in Israel because of Covid. I am proud to be nominated once again to be part of the Congress this year, along with other members of our clergy and staff team. The reason why this election is so important is the World Zionist Congress is a powerful way for Reform voices and values to have a real and impactful say in how Israel spends its money and treats its people. The WZC controls a \$1 billion budget that impacts religious pluralism, democracy and more in Israel.

Many thanks to Jose Fraga, Lauren Cantor and Ethan Grossman, along with Jeff Agron, who are all mobilizing our congregation to vote. Please stay tuned for information about an easy way to vote and make a big difference.

As we turn our focus to Israel, this month we are privileged to be welcoming the 10th President of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Dr. Andrew Rehfeld. HUC-JIR is the alma mater of all our Rabbis and our Educators, Barb Shimansky and Margie Zeskind. Dr. Rehfeld will be speaking about the Reform Movement in Israel on Friday night, March 14th. There will be a special PRE-NEG at 5:00 to welcome Dr. Andrew Rehfeld, hosted by the TBS Israel Committee. As I have mentioned before, when I studied at HUC - JIR in Jerusalem there were only a handful of Reform congregations in Israel and most people had no idea what Reform Judaism was. In Israel, you were either "Dati/Religious" or "Lo Dati/not Religious". Thanks to the heroic efforts of Reform pioneers in Israel, there are now 54 Reform congregations throughout the country.

I first met Dr. Rehfeld when he was a Professor of Political Science at Washington University in St. Louis, where my oldest daughter, Hannah, went to college. We met by chance when Dr. Rehfeld, who was chosen to speak at the Convocation assembly, happened to mention his experience in NFTY as a songleader. Sharing that connection of Reform Jewish youth group brought us together, and he was kind enough to include Hannah at his Passover Seder each year. Later, he became President and CEO of the Jewish Federation of St. Louis for several years before ascending to the Presidency of HUC – JIR. On Saturday, March 15th, Dr. Rehfeld will also lead Torah study for our congregation at 9:30 am.

Finally, I want to invite everyone to consider joining me on a Service/Solidarity Mission to Israel on Monday, April 21 – Sunday, April 27. We will be meeting with Israelis most affected by the past year's trauma, visiting the sites scarred by October 7th and the monuments/ graffiti that have marked this period for Israel, and doing meaningful "roll up your sleeves" volunteering in preparing food for those in need, planting or harvesting in a field, and helping to build furniture for those who lost everything in Gaza. # **Innovative School**

Dear Families,

As we weave the threads of destruction, community, connection, and joy together, we can discover parallel narratives between the Reggio Emilia Approach and our Jewish story, out of Shushan, of Purim. In one of the many possible parallel narratives, the Reggio Emilia Approach and the Purim story celebrate the joy of childhood, curiosity, and resilience in ways that beautifully intertwine. In Reggio Emilia, children are seen as strong, capable, and full of wonder. Their joy is not a fleeting emotion but a deep, essential part of learning and growing. Purim is a holiday infused with childlike joy—costumes, playful storytelling, and an uninhibited sense of celebration. The commandment to be joyful on Purim, particularly for children, reflects the belief that joy is not frivolous; it is transformative.

Within the Reggio Emilia approach, children are encouraged to embrace uncertainty, to see challenges as opportunities for growth. This aligns with the spirit of Purim, where we see the story of Purim recounting the most severe threats faced by the Jewish people in Shushan, marking the beginning of our ancestors' path to survival and triumph telling a timeless story that has provided hope, inspiration, and trust even in times of uncertainty for generations

The hardships described in this story resonate far beyond their ancient context. They remind us of the devastating impact of systemic oppression on societies, as seen in Shushan, and throughout the ages in more modern and recent histories. The experience of Reggio Emilia under Fascism and war is one example of this, and more recently, the horrific events of October 7 in our Homeland and the devastating resonating effects on our Jewish communities throughout the world. We are living the effects of this daily as we witness how our peoplehood feels challenged and in need of recalibration and solidarity. Looking at this story and Reggio's experience can offer profound insights into resilience, transformation, trust in uncertainty, and hopeful healing.

In Shushan, Haman's decree unraveled society, striking at its stability, governance, and daily life. The Jewish people, though on the brink of destruction, witnessed the turmoil around them while navigating their own fears and uncertainties about the future. Similarly, during World War II, Reggio Emilia endured bombings, political oppression, and the dehumanizing effects of Fascist ideology. The war fractured families, destroyed communities, and left a profound psychological toll on the region. Yet, both share a

powerful outcome: the capacity to reimagine community and identity. From the ashes of devastation, the Jewish people in Shushan emerged as a unified nation, bound by shared purpose and faith. Likewise, Reggio Emilia rebuilt itself, transforming education into a democratic, collaborative, and resilient force that has become a global model. These stories remind us that struggles can be transformed into enduring legacies.

As I have shared in previous HaKOL writings this year, a diverse team of our clergy, professionals, parents and lay leaders would be studying together in Reggio to glean wisdom from the lessons from the Reggio Emilia Municipality, as well as of course the lived values and unique culture of Temple Beth Sholom, the Innovative School, and the Reform Jewish Community and to help guide us as we work to nurture our one community of belonging here at Temple Beth Sholom. We had the opportunity to go to Reggio and while we were in Reggio, we experienced the transformative spirit of Reggio Emilia firsthand. Immersed in this remarkable city, we found deep connections between its narrative and our Jewish story. Themes of transformation, journey, leadership, connection, reflection, respect, and relationship came alive in meaningful ways.

In Reggio Emilia, transformation is seen as both a communal and individual process. The Jewish people's triumph in the Purim story was not simply about survival but about reshaping their identity and strengthening their collective purpose. Our time and reflection during our experience in Reggio Emilia punctuated how everyone's voice counts, from birth through the full journey of life. We experienced how our differences increase our possibilities, and we know just how meaningful it will be to bring our community members—everyone around this table and beyond—into this process as together we grow us.

With renewed purpose, unity, and trust, we are ready to continue building a community of oneness and shared vision, drawing on the wisdom and resilience of both the story of Purim and the principles and practices of Reggio Emilia and the rich, shared values of our TBS Community and the Jewish people.

I am sharing with you an op-ed I wrote that was recently published in The Jerusalem Post. The article reflects on how recent events have reshaped the way we approach Jewish and Israel education. The emotional and psychological impact of the October 7th attacks has shifted the landscape, and it has become clear that empathy, vulnerability, and adaptability are more important than ever in educational work.

In this piece, I explore how we must not only teach about Israel but also provide a safe space for our learners to process their emotions, questions, and challenges. This moment calls for a new kind of education—one that nurtures both intellectual and emotional resilience in the face of uncertainty.

I hope this reflection sparks meaningful conversation and encourages us all to think about how we can support each other and our learners during these times.

Jewish and Israel education are always evolving, but since October 7, everything has changed. As an educator, deeply embedded in this work, I think about what it means to teach and engage in this new moment.

The recent conference "The Path Forward: Your Post-October 7th Toolkit," hosted by The Jewish Education Project, offered valuable insights. However, the most significant takeaway for me wasn't just about new tools

for the classroom – it was the need for adaptability, empathy, and vulnerability in our roles as educators.

Before October 7, the rhythm of Jewish and Israel education was framed by routine. We focused on curriculum, historical narratives, and contemporary issues, working to instill in our learners a sense of Jewish identity, pride, and connection to Israel.

We also sought to create environments for critical thinking, encouraging learners to ask questions and engage with complex topics. While the world of education was always dynamic, the expectations for what our learners needed were relatively clear.

But post-October 7, the ground beneath our feet shifted. The events of that day, and the ongoing aftermath, have forced us to rethink how we engage with our learners and each other.

The emotional, psychological, and political landscapes are now far more complicated, and the tools we once relied on to teach and connect feel insufficient. We need something deeper: an approach that acknowledges the emotional weight of this moment and helps our learners navigate the complexities of their Jewish identities, emotions, and the ongoing conflict.

One of the central takeaways from the conference was the importance of empathy and active listening. Our learners are living in a world where they are constantly exposed to news that feels deeply personal and overwhelming.

Whether it's the media barrage or the direct impact on their families and communities, learners no longer enter the classroom with the same emotional detachment they once had.

Learners' questions about Israel were often driven by curiosity. Today, those same questions are laden with emotion – fear, anger, and confusion.

Previously, educators could rely on historical context and facts to guide the conversation. Now, we must be present in an entirely different way – creating spaces where learners feel safe to express their emotions and process them together.

As part of this new environment, educators also need flexible, responsive curriculum that can adapt to the ever-changing world we live in. This doesn't mean abandoning core principles or values but rather revisiting them in light of new challenges.

For example, Israel's role in Jewish education has always been central, but now the conversation can no longer be limited to historical narratives or political debates. It must also address trauma, resilience, and the complexity of the current moment.

In 2025, I find myself thinking about how we can help our learners build emotional and intellectual muscles to navigate their Jewish identities and Israel.

How will we teach a generation of young Jews who are learning about Israel not only through textbooks but through lived experiences – through stories of loss, fear, and survival? How do we equip them to critically engage with the complexities of Jewish identity while also providing space to process their own emotions?

In my own programs, I have already witnessed how these shifts are taking place. After October 7, one of my typically quiet learners came to me after class, visibly shaken. Her family had been deeply affected by the violence, and she was struggling to reconcile her

Jewish identity with the fear and uncertainty she was feeling.

Rather than offering a quick answer or directing her to a lesson, I simply listened. In that moment, what she needed wasn't an educational response – it was a space to be heard, to process, and to feel supported.

Parents, too, have approached me with a renewed sense of urgency. They are focused not only on ensuring that their children are informed about Israel but that they are also equipped to manage the emotional toll these events are taking.

There is a growing recognition that education cannot be separated from emotional well-being. Today's learners are carrying the weight of a world that feels much more uncertain, and they need the tools to navigate that. Educators and other leaders can help them by creating community in our educational spaces.

In a world that feels increasingly divided and fraught, we must offer not only knowledge but also healing, community, and hope.



Welcome to another in our series exploring the volunteer experiences of our members in Israel after October 7, 2023.

My Volunteer Experience in Israel – by Anita Grossman

I had contemplated going to Israel to volunteer for several months. My concerns with making the journey were: what would I do, where would I stay, how would I get around, and then how to choose the right time with my already scheduled trips. Finally, when having an opportunity to go on another trip to a new destination, I decided that it was more important to go to Israel. So, I posted on the TBS Lovers of Israel WhatsApp Group Chat that I was looking for someone to go with me to Israel to volunteer in September 2024. I was so excited when Cathy Tighe responded that she was interested! We then began to plan our important work. With the help of Marc and Karen Rivo and Malka Mordujovich, we put together a rather loose 10 -day itinerary.

During our first week, we stayed at the Maxim Hotel in Tel Aviv which gives discounts on rooms for volunteers. It was full of volunteers from all over the world, all participating in different opportunities, from picking vegetables, stocking distribution centers, taking people to therapists and doctors, serving food to soldiers in the Gaza envelope and those who just finished volunteering with the IDF on military bases. Each day, Cathy and I decided what we wanted to do. Transportation was available for some of the activities; however, we learned to navigate the buses, trains, and ride shares. One day we rented a car with 2 other volunteers and drove to Shuva Junction, where we helped prepare and serve food to our soldiers fighting in Gaza who have an hour or two respite and must stay in the fighting envelope. Another day, we took a bus provided by a program called Leket Yisrael and picked eggplant in Tevul, right on the Gaza border. We also stocked distribution centers in Tel Aviv and visited Hostage Square in Tel Aviv.

Week Two was spent with the program *Livnot U'Lehibanot* (To Build and Be Built). This is a five to seven-day program for adults 21 and up. It is a great opportunity for college students and young professionals. During the morning and early afternoon we painted the living quarters of the Thai farm workers on Kibbutz Kfar Aza, so that the workers could return to the kibbutz. We also painted the interior of a community center that was sponsored by JNF. In the afternoon, we were taken to the site of the Nova massacre, the Sderot police station, the car cemetery, and other significant sites. The entire program was planned and staffed by professionals who were wonderful to work with. At a barbeque, we provided for the soldiers protecting Kibbutz Alumin. I got a private tour of the dairy farm, which of course was full of COWS! (For those who don't know me, I have an extensive cow collection).

These were just some of the highlights of my trip. Everyone we met was so appreciative of our presence. I truly believe that our

brethren in Israel are not only protecting our homeland but are protecting Jews around the world. We need to help those who are making the sacrifice of leaving families and livelihoods to fight. We need to help rebuild our Land so our people can return to their homes and Israel survives. I am hoping to return in the next few months, so if anyone wants to join, please let me know. There are volunteer opportunities available for all.














#### TBS Goes to the Miami Beach Pride Parade
